Tampering With Safety.

City crews this week, within the relatively short space of an hour or so, doubled the number of boulevard stops on Crenshaw Blvd. between Palos Verdes Drive North and Wilshire Blvd.

At the insistence of a member, the city council last week overrode the advice of its professional traffic engineer and ordered the installation of a stop sign on Crenshaw Blyd, at its intersection with Sonoma, described by the councilman as a through street. (Most motorists would consider a street with six boulevard stops in six blocks as anything but a "through" street).

Installation of the new sign this week end was made just one block south of the only other boulevard stop sign on the entire length of the heavily traveled between its nominal terminals of Wilshire Blvd. and Palos Verdes Drive North. Granted, there once was a stop sign in the Liemert Park area of Los Angeles, but the traffic congestions and accidents at the intersection

Regulation of traffic in a metropolitan area such as Los Angeles County can not be accomplished at the whim of individuals. Scientific studies of traffic flow, combined with years of serious research on the most effective ways of moving large volumes of traffic with the least hazard to all concerned have all but eliminated the stop sign on major arteries.

For the city council to decide on its own that a boulevard stop should be installed on a busy street over the objections of its trained and highly competant professional engineer certainly does not lie beyond the scope of its power, but we think, it goes beyond the bounds of sound reasoning.

Such stop signs neither ease the flow of traffic nor reduce the hazards of the intersection-but, on the contrary, they compound the problems of moving traffic and add four-fold to the probability of accidents.

The new Sonoma boulevard stop and the one at Eldorado should be eliminated. The costs to the public in inconvenience and increased accident probability far outweigh the value of having octagonal monuments erected on street corners.

School Issue Supported

Torrance voters approved the Torrance Unified School District's request for a 50-cent override tax at a special election held last Tuesday.

This newspaper supported the Board's position and urged passage of the additional tax, a policy based on the conclusion that the additional funds urgently are needed if the schools are to maintain their services to the children of the community at an adequate level.

The special election attracted a large turn out, and carried by the margin of 430 votes. There were 6742 of the 13,854 who expressed themselves as opposed to granting the additional funds.

Our interpretation of the results seems to indicate that most voters are willing at their own expense to support their schools and that there are many others who feel the costs already are too high.

As school authorities have emphasized, the additional money made available by the override still places the schools in a position where maximum economy must be the watchward throughout this city's burgeoning educational system.

Semantics, D.C. Style

A semanticist might fathom the logic expressed last week by newly appointed U.S. Commissioner of Education Sterling M. McMurray, but he certainly leaves many people wondering.

"I see no reason why federal aid to education must mean some kind of federal dictation to local institutions," said the University of Utah administrator and professor upon his appointment to the top federal school job.

In the next breath, however, McMurray cautioned that "without a strong, centralized government agency taking a firm hand in the educational direction of the nation, we are likely to drift in such a way that our educational institutions will not satisfy the demands of the nation.

If a "firm" federal hand in any enterprise -- particularly that of a lower echelon of government doesn't mean federal dictation, then most Americans have been misreading their recent history.

YOUR INCOME TAX

Not All Income Counts For Taxes, Experts Say

(This is the second of a series of articles on federal and California income tax filing. This information has been provided by the Committee on Taxation of The California Society of Certified Public Accountants.)

Not all the money you re-ceived during 1960 was "in-come" in the eyes of the federal government. Much of it does not need to be reported at all — and here, surprisingly, is where taxpayers make the greatest number of mis-

You don't, for example, list Social Security benefits, Rail-road Retirement Act benefits, or payments received under Workmans Compensation

Nor do you list gifts, inheritances or bequests.

But you DO list tips. These are income because they are construed to be compensation for services.

What about "dividends" received from an unmatured life insurance policy? They
DON'T need to be listed because they are considered
merely a refund of part of
the premium you paid.

As for dividends from corporations, some are partly or fully non-taxable and others are reportable on the federal return as long-term capital gains. (In such cases the company will usually send you a notice explaining how to report the dividend.)

Damages received for per-sonal injuries are not consid-ered taxable income, whether awarded by a court or settled

When listing your income you can also omit govern-ment benefits to veterans and their families — except non-disability retirement pay and the interest on terminal leave bonds

On your federal return you must include your inter-est from United States Bonds but you need not include in terest on state and municipal bonds. However, when pre-paring your California return, the reverse is true. You may exclude your United States Bond interest but must include your income from state and municipal bonds of states other than California.

Don't Burn the Mortgage

But if you must hold a public doings for your now paid for lodge or church, set a match to some "dummy," or photo copy of the mortgage. Keep your original note and mortgage as a safeguard against non-payment claims and the like.

Some people think a mortgage is worthless after you pay it off. But the mortgage shows that you have given a lien to the lender as security upon centain real estate. Lenders usually record and

file their mortgages so that prospective buyers can know of the lien. When you pay the debt, get a written "satisfaction of the mortgage" to show that the lien has been wiped out. Otherwise it might even hap-
