. . . HE EMPHASIZED that these statistics include only the known, active addicts listed by the Federal Bureau of Nar-cotics. It applies only to per-sons known to be addicted to "hard" n a r c ot i c s such as heroin, opium, morphine and the hypnotic drugs.

"This does not include those persons who are addicted to marajuana, which is a particu-larly serious problem in California. The use of marajuana is usually the first step toward becoming addicted to heroin. Thus these figures by the Fed-eral Bureau of Narcotics show what the minimum problem is," Supervisor Hahn declared.
