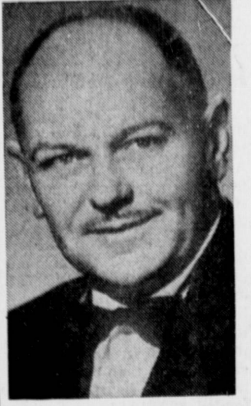

## Plan More Than 100 Courses for Harbor Tech

More than 100 courses will be offered by Harbor College during the six weeks summer session from July 10 to Aug. 18, according to an announcement today by Dr. Robert V. Bacon, Dean of Summer Session.

The number of courses represents an increase of 32 over last year and is the largest number ever offered during the summer in the history of the college, Bacon said.

Courses to be given in the eight divisions of the curriculum include technical, business, liberal arts, and science courses.

AMONG individual subjects are physics, chemistry, biology, mathematics, business, English, speed reading, electronics, printing, architecture, art, drafting, philosophy, speech, nursing, history, psychology, and many others.

All courses are tuition free, carry regular college credit, and meet from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. Mondays through Fridays. No admission tests or transcripts are required. Any high school graduate or person 18 or over may attend.

COUNSELORS will help students plan their programs during registration and will be available during the entire summer session.

Registration for all students will be held from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. and from 6 to 8 p.m. on May 18 and 19 and on July 6 and 7. No individual appointments are necessary for summer session registration.

"Summer session is particularly valuable to four groups: high school students who want to get an early start on college programs or to make up course deficiencies; college students who want to complete units toward graduation; employees who wish to improve skills and prepare for better positions; and everyone interested in self-improvement and continuing his education," Bacon stated.
