

# Buckalew Qualifies for Olympic Trials

Lose Opener, 10-5

## 'Umps Blew It' Saxons Contend

If Mira Costa missed the bases, the umpires missed the call, and North High missed the boat Tuesday when the Saxons were upended 10-5 in their Bay eagie opener at North.

Mira Costa, favored by most prep followers as the team to beat for the championship, walloped three home runs off a pitcher Tuesday but received possibly its biggest booster in the third inning when two umpires possibly boo-booped on a missed base appeal by the Saxons.

At least, that's what North contends today as they prepare for this afternoon's contest with Morningside in Inglewood.

The incident occurred in the third inning, when Micoichi's Joey Moeller — who had five RBIs for the afternoon — clouted a three run homer (?).

North contended that Moeller missed first base on his romp to the plate. The Saxon argument was supplemented by "eyewitness" reports from the stands.

But the umpires said "no" and the three runs stood, giving Costa a 5-2 lead.

As it was, North missed out again when one umpire disclosed after the game that a Micoichi

baserunner overstepped second base on the same play.

"We didn't see that, so we didn't appeal it," Coach Bob Shoup said later.

Three costly errors also paved the way for North's downfall, each error resulting in unearned runs.

The Saxons clubbed Moeller (6 ft. 4 in. righthander) for eight base hits, the big blows being Dave Marsden's two-run first, Dwayne Merrill and Jim Carrico had two hits apiece.

North's cross-town relatives didn't fare any too well Tuesday either.

Torrance was nicked by Culver City, 7-6, as a two-run 7th inning rally sputtered out, and South was clubbed by Aviation, 11-3.

Aviation scored eight runs in the first inning on just four hits, coupled with three errors and three walks.

Today, South goes against Chadwick in a non-league fracas, and Torrance will pitch Tommy Richardson against El Segundo's much publicized Bob Flynn at Recreation Park in El Segundo.

Flynn has two non-league no-hitters under his belt.

Trials in Ames, Iowa April 18-21

Former Torrance High wrestler Stuart Buckalew has qualified to participate in the Olympic Wrestling Tryouts in Ames, Iowa, in April to determine the United States representatives in the Olympic Games in Rome this summer.

Buckalew, a college freshman, defeated six opponents last week in the 147½ pound weight classification to win the Southern Pacific AAU Tournament at the Long Beach Naval Station to qualify for the trip.

Jun Watanabe (114½) of El Camino, who was second in his division, also qualified for the trip to the Olympic trials.

BUCKALEW, who was second in the Southern California Interscholastic Federation tournament as a high school senior at Torrance last year, had a 15-2 won-lost record at El Camino this season.

He also was second in the state.

On his way to the AAU title, Stuart dined on Fred Parker in the finals. Parker was the El Toro Marine Base champion.

Buckalew says that he will make the trip to Ames for the four-day trials beginning April 18 if he can obtain a sponsor.

Buckalew is the second El Camino wrestler in the school's history to win an AAU-sponsored Olympic Style Tournament.
