### Food Sanitation Class Scheduled Here This Week

A course in food sanitation sponsored by the Los Angeles County Health Department, Bureau of Sanitation, will be held at the Torrance High School Cafeteria, 2200 W. Carson St., on Tuesday, March 29 and Thursday, March 31, Dr. Roy O. Gilbert, County Health Officer announced today.

Restaurant management and employees of commercial food establishments in the Torrance, Dominguez, and Gardena areas will have the opportunity of reviewing the latest developments in hygienic food handling techniques.

Health Department experts in food sanitation will conduct the course which will be highlighted with a discussion on the legal regulations governing the handling and processing of food, and include demonstrations and movies.

The course will be conducted in two sessions. Each session will be presented twice daily, from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m., and then repeated at 7:30 p.m. and 9:30 p.m. To complete the course it will be necessary to attend one session each day.

Although the course is designed for restaurant, club, institutional and school employees who prepare or handle food, members of church and community groups or any other interested persons may also attend.

Individual food handler certificates denoting satisfactory completion of the course will be given those who attend both class sessions. A wall certificate, suitable for display, will be given each establishment if management and new employees complete the course.

6. IT TENDS to break the old tendency to make reading the main subject in which individualism is practiced.

7. When children succeed, as the multigrade helps them to do, discipline problems decrease.

8. Each child gets a turn at being the oldest, in the middle, and the youngest child in class.

9. Multigrades were studied thoroughly by the Board of Education, the Superintendent, and other staff members before they were expanded. They also have been investigated by many other school districts, a number of which later adopted similar programs—Time, Newsweek, Redbook, The Nation's Schools, Western Family, and others—investigated and wrote favorably. Parents whose children were enrolled also reacted generally favorably when queried.

10. MULTIGRADES cost no more than the traditional program.

11. When any new system is developed, people have many questions and many oppose it simply because it is new. This is to be expected.

"We are expanding this program because we feel that our research and experience in multigrades have proven the program to be worthwhile," the Superintendent declared. "We welcome questions from parents. If they like what they find, we invite them to enroll their children. If they still prefer the traditional system, their children can remain in that."
