



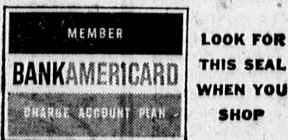

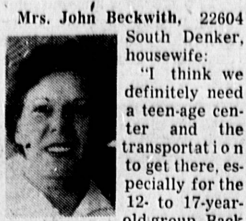

the council, opened up on the city council and police department last week asking for an elected police commission to prevent "political pressure" on the department and was immediately accused by Mayor Albert Ison, whose seat is not at stake in the election, of engaging in gutter politics.

Carreiro, Walter J. Keberlein, and James "Chic" Cicchini, who disclaim they constitute a ticket but who endorse each other, have declared that they would use the prestige of their city council office if elected to open a probe into the operation of the school district.

Roger Hogue has stated he will work for continuous improvement of the city's drainage system, street lighting, and traffic controls.

Councilmen Nick Drale, Victor Benstead, and Bob Jahn — with 12, 8, and 4 years under their belts on the job respectively — apparently feel their stand on all the issues has been made clear throughout the years.
