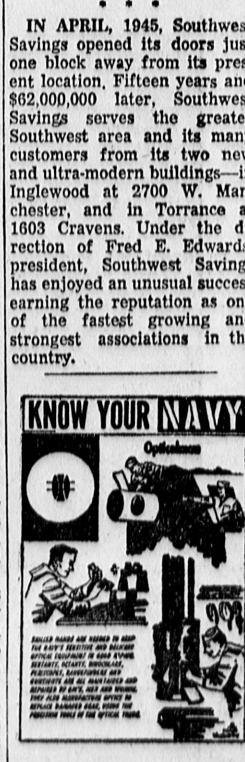
The girls elect new officers each month. Those serving for April are: Chairman, Laura Robertson; secretary, Jill Dosey, and treasurer, Janis Croskrey.
