

Officials, Civil Defense Leaders Invited to Hear Briefing on SAC

An overall picture of the deterrent concept, fostered and maintained by the Air Force's Strategic Air Command, will be provided to civic and civil defense officials, along with more than 600 Air Force Reserve Officers from the South Bay and Long Beach areas at 7 tonight at Lakewood High School, Long Beach, announces Lt. Col. Oscar A. Grab, commander of the South Bay's 9450th Air Reserve Squadron.

The briefing will cover the global operations of SAC, its weapons systems and its personnel. Much of this information was formerly classified.

Among communities whose officials have been invited to attend are Redondo, Hermosa, and Manhattan Beaches, Torrance, El Segundo, Gardena, Palos Verdes Estates, Long Beach, Hittler, South Gate, Compton, and Santa Ana.

A TEAM of officers from headquarters, Fifteenth Air Force, March Air Force Base, will conduct the briefing, designed to inform responsible citizens and reservists about the nation's principal deterrent air arm.

Heading the team will be Col. Horace E. Frink Jr., director of information, Fifteenth Air Force; Lt. Col. George J. Keely, special assist-

ant for operations, and Lt. Col. William A. Adams Jr., chief of the professional branch in the Directorate of Personnel.

THESE OFFICERS will speak, also using slides, on the capabilities of such SAC weapons as the B-47 Stratofortress, B-52 and B-52G Stratofortress (the G model capable of launching the Hound Dog air-to-air missile), B-58 Hustler, the KC-97 Stratotanker and KC-135 Jet Stratotanker.

Missiles, with capabilities and ranges, to be discussed are the SM-62 Snark, SM-65 Atlas, SM-68 Titan, GAM-72 Quail (the decoy), and GAM-77 Hound Dog and the Minuteman, the latter in the development phase within USAF.

The briefing also will provide information on SAC's personnel, its problems, its experience, the combat and non-combat time of its officers and airmen, number of hours flown, average age, and average amount of time in the Air Force.

Coffee Urges Less Spending By Government

Tom Coffee, candidate for the 17th Congressional District, Republican nomination, was guest speaker this week at the Torrance Republican Club, according to announcement by the president of the club, Tom Brewer.

Coffee strongly urged less federal spending and more economy in the cost of governmental operation.

The candidate also stated that he was opposed to the farm subsidy program because as a result of this law city housewives are compelled to pay much higher prices for food in the retail market. Coffee favored the construction of fewer irrigation projects, because when crops increase in number the Federal Government, under the subsidy plan, is required to pay more money to farmers to restrict land crops.

The following were elected to office by members of the Torrance Republican Club: Tom Brewer, president; John Kesson, vice president, and John Crain, secretary-treasurer.

Business Must Share Blame for Featherbedding

Pressing his campaign for nomination as the Republican candidate for the 17th Congressional seat, Candidate Tom Coffee asserted today that "many businessmen as well as labor leaders are guilty of perpetuating feather-bedding in many industries."

"These businessmen," Coffee noted, "accept the feather-bedding clauses in contracts and then pass the increased costs on to the consumer while crying loudly that they can do nothing to stop the condition."

THE PARTY endorsed candidate, Coffee made the assertions at a series of "Coffee Hours" throughout the district during the past week.

"If businessmen exhibited the qualities of rugged individualism they claim to have," Coffee explained, "then these clauses would not be continued from contract to contract and laws would be needed only to protect the weak."

COFFEE ADDED that he favors anti-featherbedding laws, but "many of the troubles which businessmen now faces have been of their own making by failing to face up to their own responsibility."
