#### 1960 TROUT SEASON **OPENS ON APRIL 30**

The 1960 trout season wil open statewide, except for the northwest corner of the state, on April 30.

Nimrods who have not already obtained their 1960 fishing licenses are reminded by the Department of Fish and Game they have but two weeks to do so if they intend to be out on opening day.

Except for the Southern California counties of Santa Barbara, Ventura, Los Angeles, San Bernardino, Orange, Riverside, San Diego and Imperial, which are open for trout fishing the year around, the trout season closes throughout the state October 31.

Statewide bag limit is 10 trout or salmon in combination, but no more than 10 pounds and one fish. In the Southern California counties cited above, the summer limit changes to a winter of 5 trout (but not more than 10 pounds and 1 trout) efective October 1.

Fishing licenses may be obtained from any license dealer. For trout fishing, anglers must obtain a basic license (\$3.00) and two license stamps (\$1.00 each).
