First Citizens Talk Over Local History at Party

At The Palms, Easter Sunday, Capt. Donald Findley, USA Ret., 84, entertained his long time "pal" Richard R. Smith, president emeritus of the Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial Hospital, who was celebrating a birthday. The party included Mrs. Smith and Miss Lucretia Findley, sister of Capt. Findley (who prefers to be known as Don), Miss Elizabeth Crowel and Miss Dorothy Barton of Los Angeles.

Mr. Smith, one of the first residents of Torrance, who selected the site for its first industry, the Union Tool Company (now known as National Supply) served the Torrance Hospital as president for approximately thirty years; while Donald Findley recommended the site for the hospital to the widow of Mr. Torrance and Mrs. Isabel Henderson, librarian at that time, and mother of the present librarian.

Donald Findley has served the community for over 30 years. During this time he has been city attorney, treasurer of the Chamber of Commerce, belonging since 1922. He also served as chairman of the County Library Advisory Committee, chairman of a draft appeals board during World War II; as well as active in the efforts of the City to withdraw its public schools from the Los Angeles school system; and a charter member of the Rotary Club, treasurer

of the American Legion Building Committee when constructing its club house on Carson St.; and a member of the local Masonic Lodge.

At the same time he was vice-president and manager of the Dominguez Land Corp. until its dissolution in 1940, when he obtained the revisionary rights to the streets, parks and alleys for a corporation known as Remco-Real Estate Management Co., which he controls.
