ANGLERS ADVISED OF LAWS TO LOOK OUT FOR

In connection with the opening of the general trout season Saturday, anglers, especially newcomers to the sport, were advised by the Department of Fish and Game today of what to look out for to avoid running afoul of the law.

The most common order of pitfalls is as follows:

1. Possession of proper license (basic license with two stamps for trout)

2. Fishing hours (one hour before sunrise to one hour after sunset, in most instances).

3. Gear Restrictions (one closely attended rod or handline—uo more than three hooks).

4. Bait Regulations (chummung prohibited in nearly all inland waters).

5, Bag limits (ten trout or salmon in combination, but not more than 10 pounds and one fish, generally).

6. Special stream closures.

All fishermen will benefit by close reading of the 1960 Sport Fishing Regulations. A copy of the regulations is available free from the license dealer.

OddballOctopus Shows up Again In Monterey Bay

A rarely seen California octopus was taken by a trawl boat off Monterey Bay last month. It is commonly called a flapjack devilfish, but its scientific name is Opisthoteuthis Californiana Berry. The Berry is after S. Stillman Berry, a marine biologist, who first described the animal in 1948. Only four known specimens have ever been captured in California waters.

A "web-fotted" octopus, all eight tentacles are joined by a flabbly web of flesh—why, nobody knows.

The innards of this beast are peculiar, too. Many accoutrements of the nomral octopus are just not to be found in the flapjack devilfish.

Berry describes it as "re-sembling in about equal de-gree a soggy pancake or very dirty floor-mop."
