Shakespeare Excerpts to Open May Festival of the Arts Friday

The annual May Festival of the Arts, sponsored by the Torrance Civic Symphony, will open May 6 at the Redondo Union High School auditorium with the Hollywood Shakespeare Festival presenting excerpts from some of the bard's famous works.

Led by David Bond, actor, playwright, and producer, the players have appeared in theaters, bowls, universities, and in other presentations. Choreography for the local presentation is being handled by Dancer Jon Angelo.

EXCERPTS from such works as "Measure for Measure," "Love's Labour's Lost," "Troilus and Cressida," "King John," and "Two Gentlemen from Verona" will be presented along with songs and dances of the Elizabethan period.

Included in the cast are Marie Pringle, Jayne Drennan, Anna Laura, Zachary Berger, Howard Lucas, Natalia Targo, Elaine Hopp, Miriam Gibson, Herbert Windsor Jr., Gladys Khearn, Chad Howard, Bill Wahl, Juney Ellies, Mitzi Hoag Wolfson, and Eileen San.

THE ACTORS and actresses will be costumed, but there will be no scenery, according to Miss Elyse Aehle, director of the sponsoring Civic Symphony.

Background and interlude music will be provided by the virginal and recorders of the

"Elizabethan Consort," with Tom Wisse conducting.

ON THE SECOND night of the Festival, May 7, 8-year-old Jimmy Howard of Torrance will be featured on the piano with the orchestra. The Morrelli Ballet Company will be presented also on that evening. The art exhibit, which opens Friday, will remain open until 6 p.m. Sunday, closing the festival.

Garrett Has 59 Per Cent Net Increase

The Garrett Corp. has reported a net profit of \$3,901,000 after taxes from consolidated sales of \$166,614,000 during the nine months period ended March 31, 1960, it was announced by J. C. Garrett, president. Profit before taxes was \$8,237,000.

Net income for the nine months was 59 per cent higher than that of last year's corresponding period when profits totaled \$2,451,000 from sales of \$131,092,000. Sales were up \$35,521,000 or 27 percent over the same period last year.

Per share earnings for the company were \$3.66 compared with \$2.30 per share at this time last year, based on 1,064,971 shares outstanding on March 31, 1960.

Supervisors Approve First Step In Long Range Barrier Program

The first step in a long-range program to build a barrier against further sea water intrusion along an 11-mile stretch of the shoreline has been taken, Supervisor Burton W. Chace has reported.

Acting on a recommendation by M. E. Salsbury, chief engineer of the County Flood Control District, the Board of Supervisors authorized the District to negotiate a contract for consulting engineering services.

CHACE REPORTED that the project is vitally needed in an area running from Ballona

Creek to the Palos Verdes Hills because the intrusion of sea water into fresh water wells underlying the West Coast Basin has destroyed many of them and threatens the destruction of others.

Broken into units, the program is expected to take about four or five years to complete. Unit one of the water supply facility will consist of the construction of pipelines, a chlorination plant, probably a pressure regulating plant and supporting fixtures, Chace said.

ESTIMATED COST for the overall project is expected to

run about \$4,600,000 with the first unit likely to require approximately \$1,600,000.

Financing will be handled by the Flood Control District from its regular funds and Zone II monies, Chace reported.

The District has been making tests and geological explorations along a one-mile reach of the coastline in the Manhattan Beach area since 1950. Results have determined that a freshwater barrier to sea water intrusion will control the problem and, in addition, provide a water supply for the depleted basin.

WORK ALONG the 11-mile area has been delayed because there hasn't been a guaranteed source of water to supply such a barrier on a long-term basis. Approval by the voters last November of formation of the Central and West Basin Water Replenishment District has assured supply of the needed water, Chace said.

The Metropolitan Water District is currently building a pipeline for delivery of water for the barrier.
