Crittenden continued. "Positive signals properly given will aid the smooth flow of traffic and help prevent collisions involving turning movements."

The Patrol commissioner also cautioned motorists to make sure their electrical signal devices, are pet flashing, when vices are not flashing when they do not plan to turn or change lanes. Improper signaling, he said, adds to the haz-ards of driving rather than reducing them.
