TACO PIE

- 1 lb. ground round
- 2 T. shortening or cooking oil
- 1 bottle Taco sauce
- 2 c corn chips
- 1 c cheddar cheese (grated)

Fry meat in oil until lightly brown. Stir in Taco Sauce. Simmer quietly for 15 minutes. Place corn chips in a 10 inch pie plate and cover with prepared meat. Add grated cheese and place in oven until melted. 350 degree oven.

MOM'S FRUIT SALAD

- No. 2 can Pineapple (tidbits)
- 2 cans mandarin oranges (one can coconut (sweetened))
- 2 cartons sour cream
- 1 pkg. marshmallows (small)
- Grapes (optional)

Let mixture stand in refrigerator for 24 hours before serving.

BOILED RAISIN COOKIES

- 2 c seeded raisins
- 1 c shortening
- 2 eggs
- 1 t. soda
- 1/2 t. salt
- 1/2 t. cloves
- 1 1/2 c sugar
- 3 1/2 c flour (sifted)
- 1 t. baking powder
- 1 t. cinnamon

Pour raisins into 2 cups water and boil for ten minutes. Add sifted ingredients in three parts to first mixture. Drop from spoon on greased sheet. Bake in 350 degree oven for 15 minutes. Makes about 50 cookies.
