The full-length color adventure centers around the devoted followers of the surf, and the waves they ride. Mr. Severson will present his program at the South High School Auditorium, May 27th, this Friday, two showings, 7 p.m. and 9 p.m. at \$1.25 general admission.

"Surf Fever" was filmed in California, Hawaii, and Mexico. The movie will be personally narrated by its creator, Severson.

Severson, himself one of the top big-surf riders, has produced with natural insight, a picture story of this fast growing sport, its feverish followers, and their greatest love — the exciting surf. He has ridden this surf... waves over twenty

feet... and conveys the thrill of it with his talent in art, his excellent photography, and a lively narration.

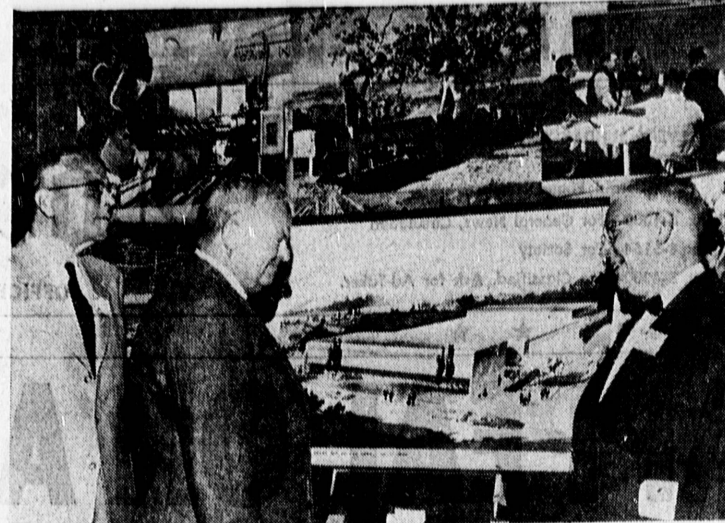
SOME OF THE surfing spots highlighted in this film will be Waiema Bay, Sunset Beach, Makaha, and Waikiki from the Hawaiian Islands.

On the California coast the surf is exploited from Santa Barbara to Carlsbad, including Secos, Malibu, Huntington Pier, Doheny, Trestle, Brooks St., San Onofre, and others. San Miguel in Baja, California, is one of the most thrilling of the small-surf sequences, with surfers riding within feet of a rock jetty.

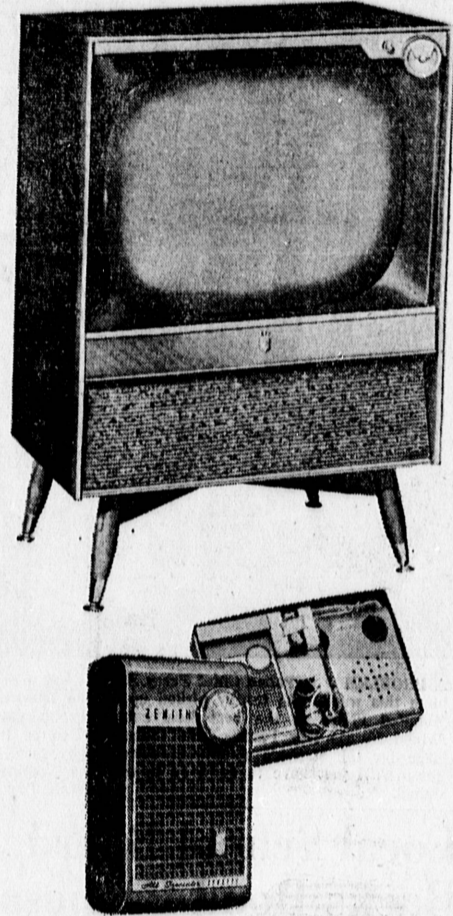

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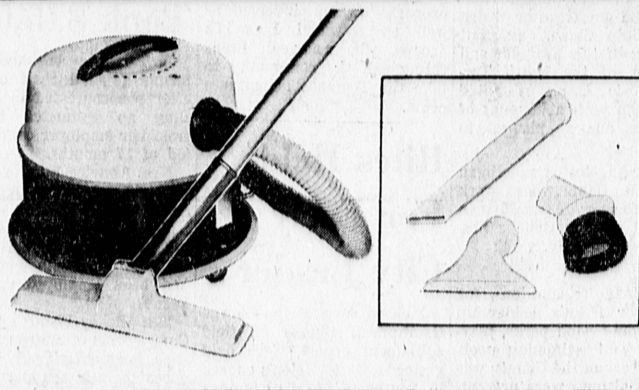

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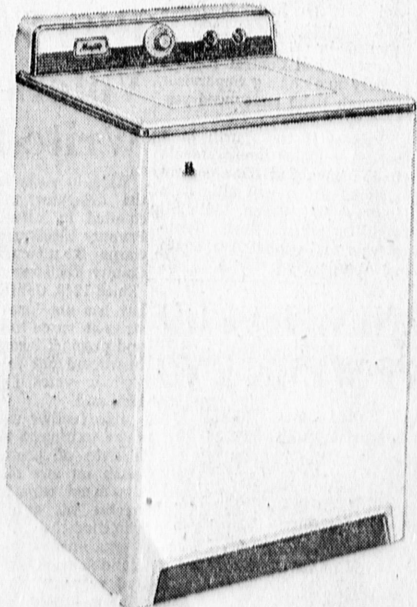

Just to Set A Proud Man's Record Straight

Harry H. Foltz, of 1317 W. 223rd St., indicated this week that the Western Greyhound Lines might do well to bring the firm's news bureau up to date on a couple of items.

Foltz, who has driven for Greyhound for 15 years and was cited in March for driving an estimated 1,250,000 miles with an unblemished safety record.

However, the news bureau reported to the Herald that he had driven 1,000,000 miles over a 10-year period for the citation.

This is to set the record straight. Foltz, who is now driving the Los Angeles-El Centro run for Greyhound, got a gold watch for the 10-year record in March, 1955.

For the additional quarter of a million miles and five years of safe driving, he will receive a valuable ring and a new Safety Award Certificate.
