A. - TO OUR knowledge there have been no reports in-dicating an increase in the sedicating an increase in the severity or number of acne cases in areas where fluoridation of the water supply is done. Furthermore, in certain portions of Texas where the natural content of fluorine in the water is many times the amount added artificially, the incidence of acne does not exceed the national average.
