YOUR DOLLARS

BUILD BETTER HEALTH... through

CLINICS (for children and adults) Treat cancer, heart disease, cerebral palsy, epilepsy, tuberculosis, arthritis, allergies, club feet, multiple sclerosis, diabetes, general health problems.

HOSPITALS (for children only) Perform blue baby operations, correct orthopaedic malformations, handle accident cases, provide complete medical services except for contagious diseases, chronic and mental illness.

HOME NURSING Care is given to persons ill at home by visiting nurses. They provide pre-natal care and help for new parents and their babies. Treat chronic diseases such as arthritis, cancer, heart ailments, tuberculosis and diabetes. Handle terminal illnesses of the aging.

HEALTH EDUCATION FOR FAMILY AND COMMUNITY Information is provided to individuals and the community on venereal disease; family life education, teen-age sex education. Services test for hearing deficiencies and advise on hearing problems... on nursing care.

MATERNITY CARE FOR UNMARRIED MOTHERS These services include medical care, planning for the unborn child and for the mother's adjustment.

DENTAL CARE FOR UNDERPRIVILEGED SCHOOL CHILDREN Services instruct parents on dental health; give emergency treatment to children in pain; provide general treatment.

MENTAL HEALTH CARE Includes psychiatric help for disturbed adults and children. Guidance for problem children and parents. Patient care for women with mild mental disorders.

YOUR DOLLARS

PREPARE FUTURE CITIZENS... through

GUIDANCE, CHARACTER AND CITIZENSHIP TRAINING Given by adult leaders to develop individual skills, teach sportsmanship, cooperation with others, moral values, self reliance. Offers physical education, camping, handicraft classes and youth counseling services.

YOUR DOLLARS

SAVE OUR CHILDREN AND YOUTH... through

GUIDANCE TO GANGS Given by specially trained adults where the gangs are found. For youth who cannot be reached by the usual agency program. Individual attention given each boy or girl, and when he's ready he is drawn into normal recreation and group activities.

ADOPTION AND FOSTER HOME CARE Children needing a temporary or permanent home are placed with carefully selected foster or adoptive parents. Skilled counselors work with parents on best plan for child.

HOMES FOR CHILDREN Food, shelter, education, medical and psychiatric care, given children who are homeless or whose families don't want or can't care for them, or those who need group living care.

CLUBS AND SETTLEMENTS FOR UNDERPRIVILEGED BOYS AND GIRLS Offer informal recreation, group activities and education under skilled direction: arts and crafts, athletics, camping, games, vocational activities. Special counseling available for the child or his parents.

REHABILITATION FOR DELINQUENTS Residential care in home-like surroundings, supervision, guidance and treatment for children and teenagers in trouble with the law. Medical and psychiatric care, educational training and individual counseling.

GUIDANCE FOR TROUBLED BOYS Individual counseling given to emotionally disturbed boys and their parents. For boys who are fatherless, professional counselors are assisted by volunteer men whose interest and influence help assure the right social and moral development.

YOUR DOLLARS

HELP FAMILIES AND INDIVIDUALS IN TROUBLE... through

FAMILY CENTERED CASEWORK SERVICES Help with marital difficulties involving divorce, desertion, sudden illness, financial difficulties, parent-child conflict, care of aging parents. Guide retired and aging. Make visits to men and women in prison, psychiatric help if needed, guidance for their families, parole advice.

HOMEMAKER SERVICE Provides a trained woman to care for and hold the family together when the mother is temporarily ill.

DAY NURSERY CARE Food, training and expert supervision given children whose mothers must work.

EMERGENCY AID Provides food, shelter and temporary financial help to individuals and families ineligible for public assistance.

INFORMATION SERVICE Talks directly with people in trouble, helping them find the right agency. Counsels with firms and organizations on help available to employees.

LEGAL ASSISTANCE Provided to those financially unable to hire private counsel for protection of their legal rights.

HELP FOR FOREIGN BORN Assistance in gaining citizenship, solving personal problems, finding jobs and making friends. Education in American customs, culture and language.

YOUR DOLLARS

HELP THE FORGOTTEN MAN... through

CARE FOR THE TRANSIENT, HOMELESS OR CONVALESCENT Food, shelter, clothing and jobs for unattached men. Counseling on personal problems, medical and rehabilitative care for the alcoholic; short time boarding and nursing care for men discharged from hospitals.

YOUR DOLLARS

SERVE THOSE WHO SERVE THEIR COUNTRY... through

CLUBS AND RECREATION CENTERS Offer constructive programs for leisure time to enlisted personnel stationed here or visiting. They can write letters, shower and shave, enjoy dancing, games, pick up tickets to shows and sports events, get information. Camp shows are provided for those stationed overseas.

HELP FOR VETERANS Information and assistance given on rights, privileges and benefits. Emergency financial help. Individual and family counseling. Develop job openings for the handicapped veteran.

BUILD AND SAFEGUARD OUR COMMUNITY... through

COMMUNITY PLANNING Volunteer committees study ways and means to avoid duplication, as well as gaps, in necessary services. They plan for the best use of health and welfare resources, develop long range plans for welfare programs, and promote public understanding and support.

DECENTRALIZED PLANNING Our family of communities has grown so fast that area councils of volunteers offer local residents a way to plan together for their local communities.

NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS Settlement and centers are dedicated to bettering conditions. Young people and adults benefit from family recreation and work together for the good of their neighborhood. These activities help ease tensions in unsettled neighborhoods.

COMMON SERVICES ... contributing to economy and efficiency

Agency Audit and Position Classification Bureau... \$14,487

A central auditing service for agencies, lowering agency overhead; common personnel service provided when problems in this field arise.

Agency Federation Relations Department... \$19,095

Provides channel for mutual cooperation of the Welfare Federation and member agencies, creating better understanding of common problems and better working relationships.

Community Chest Service Centers... \$182,221

Make services available to people in their own neighborhoods. Each center houses a number of agencies and branches of central organizations, thus substantially reducing overhead expenses.
