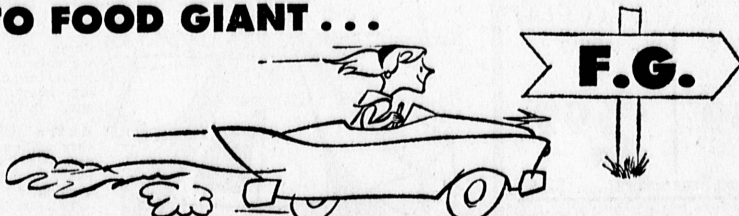

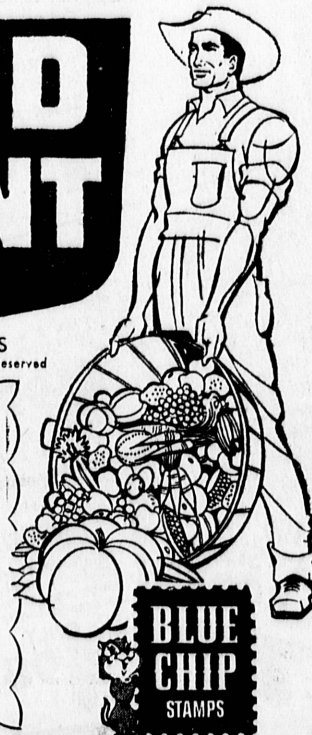

Out on the Brentwood Country Club course with them will be Recomp II, a mechanical brain built by North American Aviation's Autonetics Division.

Recomp II will be making its television debut as a computer at a sports event, and the big field of finalists will keep it busy. The Mechanical brain will be fed the names of the players and their scores and then, if they play par golf, Recomp II will be able to predict accurately the finishing scores.

Used extensively in aircraft and missile design and in all forms of engineering, the mechanical brain's chore Sunday will be as a probability estimator.
