APPLE CAKE PUDDING

1 c raisins	1 egg
(optional)	1 tsp. soda
1/2 c chopped nuts	¹ / ₂ c orange juice
2 c apples	1/2 c melted butter
1½ c flour	1 tsp vanilla
1 c sugar	1 tsp cinnamon
1/4 tsp. salt	

Combine raisins, nuts, and apples in a large bowl. Sift flour with sugar, cinnamon, salt into bowl containing fruit. Blend well. Beat egg slightly, add soda to orange juice and add to egg along with melted butter and vanilla. Combine with fruit and flower mixture. Pour into a greased 8x12 baking dish. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. Cut into squares and serve with a topping of almond flavored whipped cream.
