Chapel Outlines His Thoughts on Heavy Vote for Democrat McLain

Many newspaper editors and commentators have offered their opinion regarding the vast number of people who voted for George McLain's block of delegates on the Democratic ticket.

We know that more than 600,000 voted for McLain but why they did this and who they were cannot be known because our ballots are secret and it is impossible to check back on them, which is a good thing.

GOVERNOR Edmund G Brown at a press conference said that he attributed many of the McLain votes to: (1) His own handling of the Chessman case; (2) The resentment of some Democrats that they were not able to vote for any particular presidential candidate if they voted for the Brown ticket; (3) The opposition of almost all Southern California newspapers; and (4) The fact that George McLain is what Governor Brown calls an "adroit campaigner."

The Sacramento Newsletter, published by Floyd and Agnes Booe in Sacramento, which is a weekly report on California legislation, government and politics, said:

"RUMORS RAN rampant throughout the State immediately after Tuesday's primary that the GOP's had urged pen-

sion advocate McLain to enter his presidential delegation against Governor Brown's. However, Newsletter's sources say the idea for McLain to run was strictly the brainchild of his lobbyist and campaign manager, James Evans, after Brown failed to support certain senior citizen legislation. After McLain did get into the race, some Republicans were reported to be urging Democrats for Nixon to mark their ballots for McLain.

"McLain rejected a suggestion that his followers would vote Republican in November, saying: 'No, I'm a Democrat. The people who voted for me are Democrats. We'll stick with the Democratic Party.'"

NOW WE COME to what I know about it. During the 1960 special session, many members of the Assembly of both political parties signed a petition to the Governor to place on the agenda of the special session a bill to repeal the law known to most people as the "responsible relative's law."

The Governor refused to do this, and it antagonized George McLain's organization of senior citizens, as well as many members of the Legislature.

THIS WAS the principal reason that George McLain ran his own slate of delegates for the Presidency on the Democratic ticket. Therefore, it is

only fair to assume that a large number of Democrats who voted for McLain were senior citizens, commonly called "old age pensioners" and their relatives and friends.

Of course, some of the Democrats who voted for McLain intend to vote for Nixon in November, some were angry because the Governor did not put narcotics on the agenda of the special session, and there were many unhappy because of the Governor's tax increase program.

UNOFFICIALLY, I have been led to believe that the California State Highway Commission will allocate funds for the construction of that portion of the San Diego Freeway which runs through the 46th Assembly District, especially that portion near the Los Angeles International Airport, at their October, 1960, meeting.

It should be clearly understood that the Legislature has

THIS INCLUDED the San Diego Freeway and other freeways and highways in which the readers of this newspaper are interested. However, when the law was enacted, the responsibility for allocating money was then shifted to the State Highway Commission under the old laws which were enacted many years ago to "take freeways and highways

out of politics." The State Highway Commission is appointed by the Governor. The Legislature cannot control the Commission in any manner and even the Governor, no matter who he may be, is reluctant to interfere with their duties.

I HAVE mentioned this before but some people, either through a failure to understand the laws, or because of their anxiety to see the San Diego Freeway completed, continue to write to Senator Richards, the Governor, and me. If all goes well, the October meeting of the Commission should set their fears at rest.

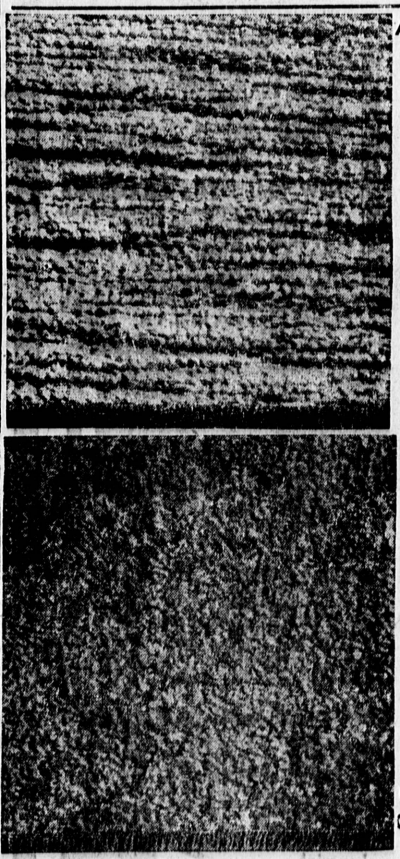
