Summer Slate Of Activities Outlined at EC

Adult recreation facilities which will be open to the public on week-days until August 26 were outlined today by Merl F. Sloan, director of student personnel, at El Camino College.

TENNIS CLASSES will be conducted on Monday and Wednesday evenings from 7 to 8 p.m. Beginners in trampoline will receive instruction from 6 to 7 p.m. on Monday and Wednesday evenings.

Badminton will be featured from 6 to 8 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday evenings, and volleyball will be the featured recreational sport for adults on Wednesday evenings from 6 to 10 p.m.

Trampoline equipment will be made available for recreational use Tuesday evenings from 6 to 10 p.m. Friday night activities will center upon basketball teams, when teams will enter into active competition.

WEIGHT LIFTING and gymnastics facilities will also be opened in the college program. A day-time schedule for youngsters is sponsored free of charge Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Student and faculty supervision is available for all phases of the El Camino summer recreational program.

Boat Parade Set Today in King Harbor

The Redondo Beach shoreline will be dotted with boats this morning at 10 a.m. when the 1960 Neptune Days Marina-Rama In-the-Water Boat Parade gets under way.

The many activities of the 1960 Neptune Days Marina-Rama will provide the participants in the In-the-Water Boat Parade with a fun-filled weekend for the boating family.

Participants will compete for first and second place silver awards in four divisions: less than sixteen feet, sixteen feet but under twenty-six feet, twenty-six feet but under forty feet, and over forty feet. In addition live awards will be made for the best boat any size. They are: Congressman King Perpetual Award, "Best Boat in Parade," Mayor's Perpetual Award, "Best Dressed Boat," Best Commercial or Municipal entry; Best Club entry; and "The Funniest Boat in the Water."

Any size boat may be entered as long as it is equipped with mechanical power which will enable it to make 5 knots headway in ocean water, and anchor, and at least 210 feet of anchor rope. The anchor and rope are safety devices to be used in case of mechanical power failure.

The parade is being organized and patrolled under the supervision of the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary, Division 6.

TV, Free Substitution Lures Prep Gridders to El Camino

High school football players in the El Camino College district have been given added incentive to enroll in the local institution through recent changes made by the Metropolitan Conference rules committee.

Free substitution will return to the conference after an eight-year absence. Since 1952 the limited substitution rules have governed junior colleges, but the return to the "two-play" system opens a wide field of positions and opportunities for young pigskin hopefuls.

BESIDES THE added attraction of free substitution, El Camino will play a practice

game at Klamath Falls, Ore., with Oregon Tech next fall. Tech was an early-season victim of the Warriors in a home game last fall.

With entrance standards being raised by many universities, it is safe to assume that more high school athletes will enter junior college for the first or second years of school. Junior college football is undoubtedly a tougher brand of ball than freshman ball at four year universities, where only four freshman games a season are scheduled. El Camino plays a 10-game schedule.

Television will also be a feature of Metropolitan contests in 1960. The conference is planning weekly telecasts of its fea-

tured football games, among which Coach Norm Verry believes will include El Camino home games against Weber, Utah, and Bakersfield, defending Junior Rose Bowl and Metro champions.

ONLY THREE stadiums in the conference are equipped with proper television facilities, El Camino included. The

Warrior games could be in the limelight quite often, as was the case in 1953, when games were televised.

Goals have been set high for 1960 by Coach Verry and his assistants, Don Jurk, Ken Swearingen, and Doug Essick. The coaching staff would like to duplicate the Braves' Metro championship and Junior Rose Bowl trip of 1954.

Hollywood Gold Cup Draws Nation's Top Turf Stars

One of the greatest collections of handicap stars ever named to a Hollywood Park race, headed by Sword Dancer, 1959 "Horse of the Year," Bald Eagle, currently the leading contender for the 1960 national championship, and Hillsdale, runner up for "Horse of the Year" last year, has been nominated for the \$162,100 Hollywood Gold Cup to be run Saturday, July 16.

The roster of 56 turf stars, released today by Racing Secretary John Maluvious, contains virtually every top handicap horse in the country and again stamps Hollypark's mile and one-quarter classic as one of turfdom's most important events in deciding national championship honors.

Fishermen Average Four Berries Daily

Barracuda, bonito and sea bass continue to provide activity for saltwater anglers in Redondo Beach waters in mid-June as the summer fishing season is fully underway.

PASSENGERS on sportfishers "Sea Hawk," "City of Redondo," and "G.W." continued to average four barracuda on all-day and half-day trips throughout the week, with 429 weekend passengers catching 1634 barracuda.

Second in popularity remained bonito, with bass third. Yellowtail and halibut still were being coy.

ACTION ON fishing barges off Redondo is primarily in the area of bass, bonito, sole and mackerel. Barges, one of which is the 300-foot-long "Sacramento," are situated two to three miles off shore and are serviced hourly by launch.

ALL-NIGHT barge fishing, on a schedule of every night except Sunday, commenced this month, according to Gordon McRae, Redondo Pleasure Fishing chief.

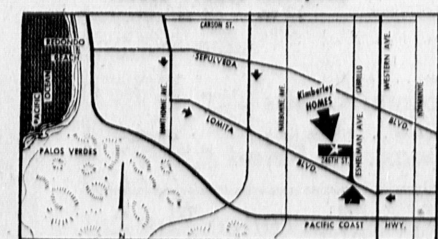
