Beasley to Urge Purchase of 3 New City Buses

Purchase of three new buses and establishment of new routes to serve rapidly growing areas will be recommended to the city council Tuesday, it was announced today by J. A. Beasley, chairman of the council's transportation committee.

Improvements to the city's bus system, in line with Beasley's long-standing campaign to encourage a useful and profitable department are expected to be approved by the council as follows:

1. A UNIFORM fare of 20 cents throughout the city. This would raise the minimum by a nickel and reduce the maximum fare by 10 cents. The price would include transfers in the same general direction of travel.

2. Purchase of three new buses at a cost of approximately \$36,000 to encourage riders and outfit new routes.

3. ESTABLISH new service for Southwest Homes, Southwood, Henrietta St. north of Torrance Blvd., and a new tract at Sepulveda and Crenshaw. New service to the Hollywood Riviera for Calle Mayor between Kathryn and Sepulveda, Calle Miramar, and the Ellenwood tract and South High School. The new routes would be on one-hour schedules throughout the day.

Beasley said the new service may cost about \$300 a week, but he expects increased patronage will reduce the system's operating deficit.
