Board Votes Request For Tax Increases

An official resolution setting Oct. 11 as the date for a tax override election, with 31 polling places for local voters, was passed by the Torrance Board of Education Tuesday night.

All 30 of the district's elementary schools will be used as polling places, as well as El Retiro Park. Torrance voters will decide whether a 50-cent override tax should be voted, in addition to the \$2.40 for educational purposes now in force.

The district has reached its legal taxing limit, although inflation, enrollment increases, and other costly factors are continuing. Since the last tax increase was approved in 1956, school enrollment has increased from 15,000 to an expected 27,000 next fall.

If passed by the voters, the tax override would become effective in 1961-62, not next year.

Sale of an additional \$770,000 in school bonds was also authorized Tuesday night by the Board of Education. The money will be used to buy two new elementary school sites in the Waleria Lake area.

Assistant Superintendent S.E. Waldrip noted that the state building fund currently does not have enough money for the purchase, so the district will have to sell more bonds. If the district had to wait another year for the money, price of the sites probably would have increased considerably, he said.

The school sites would serve a tract of 1000 or more homes currently being built in the Waleria Lake area. The district currently is studying proposed locations in the area to select the sites.

Manager Berthoud cites the Inn's convenient location to virtually all of the areas recreational facilities. Elaborate resort-type shops have been planned for leisurely gift and personal shopping.

Food in the restaurant continues under the eronal supervision of the former chef of the famous Pump Room in Chicago.
