

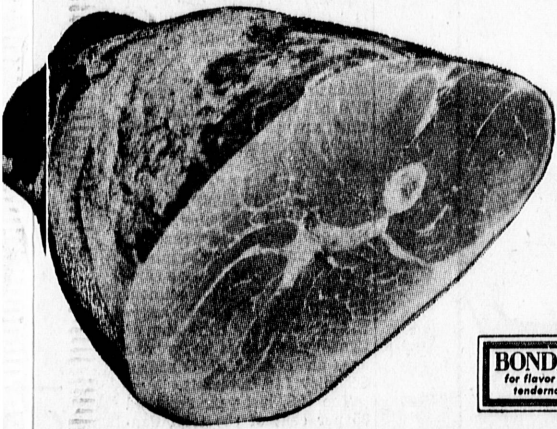

LOCAL FAMILY SUBJECT OF U.S. RUSSIAN STORY

Except for Vice-President Richard Nixon, the best known Southern Californian in Russia today may be Dr. Robert V. Bacon, Harbor College admissions coordinator and veterans' counselor.
The reason for Bacon's fame among the Russians is that he and his family are the subjects of a recent article in the magazine "America," published in the Russian language for distribution in the Soviet Union by the press and publications service of the United States Information Agency in Washington, D. C.

The 3-page feature article, illustrated with 15 photographs, shows Bacon, his wife, Helen, and their children, Chris, 9, and Debbie, 7, during a 12-day voyage aboard the liner "Constitution" enroute from New York to Greece, where Bacon was a teaching fellow during 1958-59 under the Fulbright Educational Exchange Program.

The article is entitled "At Home At Sea," and the illustrations show the members of the family on deck and in their staterooms, as they swim, play deck games, use the ship's inter-com system, take a turn at the wheel, play the piano, make purchases at the commissary, and study in the ship's library, and lounge.

THE TEXT of the story describes Bacon as representative of the 2,000 Americans who teach or study each year at foreign universities under the Fulbright Program.

The Bacon family was chosen by a photographer for the United States Information Agency on the first day of the voyage, and during the next 10 days several hundred pictures were taken, although the published article used only a fraction of the total number.
"Being camera subjects for all but two days of our first long trip outside the United States made us feel conspicuous," Bacon commented, "but the photographer was a nice person, and we became good friends."

The Bacons make their home on Buckskin Lane in Rolling Hills.
