

CHANDLER, SPEAKS, LLOYD SPARK HEAVY HITTING TORDONDO, 10-5

The strongest hitting Tordondo Little League all-star team in four years erupted for 10 runs Friday to take Silver Spur Little League with a 10-5 defeat in the first game of District 26 playoffs at the Tordondo park.

The victory enabled Tordondo to qualify to meet the winner of Saturday's South Redondo vs Pacific Little League game. The second round match will be played Monday at 5 p.m. at Tordondo Field, near the Entradero Sump site.

BESIDES pitching his one-hitter for five innings, Speaks went 4-4 at the plate and scored three runs.

Tony Barrata Of Optimists Pitches No-Hit Game in Slo-Pitch

The first no-hit, no-run game in Torrance's Slo-Pitch history was logged this week by Tony Barrata and the Hollywood Riviera Sportsmen's Club, 9-0 over the Optimists under the lights at Walteria Park.

Barrata faced only 21 batters, and was aided by two double plays, the second to end the game.

He even struck out one red-faced batter. The no-hit shutout was the Sportsmen's first goose-egg job of the year and they laid it on thick by slugging 17 base hits, including four by Bill Clary who enjoyed a perfect game at the plate. Clary's fourth bingle was a 7th inning homer. Otherwise, things were pretty

tight in slo-pitch action this week. Especially so in the rugged Blue League.

The unbeaten Tappa Keggas got the scare of their slo-pitch career but the unsung City Employees finally went down swinging, 3-2 in a thrilling eight-inning overtime contest at Torrance Park.

The Tappa Keggas scored the winning run on Ray Magnante's one-out single in the 8th as Al Calse dented the plate.

However, the Employees argue that they were "robbed" on a play at the plate in the 6th inning when Toby Venable, who tripled home Hector Molina with the tying run, was thrown out after a fly ball to

the St. James Church while Just for Fun was retaining its slim one game lead with a 13-4 romp over South Bay Church of God.

The Torrance Elks got on the easy way in the Service League, via a forfeit by the Torrance Lions.

In other Service loop games, the Riviera Sportsmen rang up their eye-popping no-hitter, and the Torrance Kiwanis remained in a second place tie by dumping their Walteria Kiwanis rivals, 7-2.

In a wild one, the Torrance Merchants did in the Torrance Herald, 11-1, after scoring eight times in the 7th inning on eight hits.

Greyhound Begins Del Mar Service

Special, direct - to - the - track, round-trip bus service from Torrance to Del Mar Race Track will be offered this year, for the first time, for the benefit of horse racing fans with the opening of the summer season racing meet on Wednesday it was announced today by Greyhound Lines.

Del Mar's racing season continues through September 13. The Del Mar special buses will operate each race day - Monday through Saturday - direct to the South Coast track. Greyhound's special excursion fare of \$6.10 will include round-trip transportation - in reclining seat coaches with seats assured for all passengers in both directions - admission to the track, federal transportation and admission taxes, and City of Del Mar admission tax.

Daily departure of the Del Mar race track special from Torrance will be at 10:10 A.M. This provides for arrival at the track well in advance of post time for the first race at 2:15 P.M. Returning, buses will leave the Del Mar track after the running of the sixth race, with the last bus scheduled for departure after the final race.

Gone With The Wind

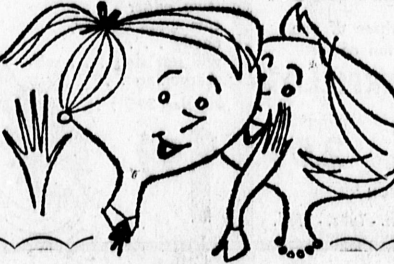
Seventy-odd years ago the racing world was agog over the prowess of Miss Woodford, the first \$100,000 winner in America, and Iroquois, American-bred Epsom Derby winner which had earned a like amount in England. Today we are similarly impressed by Round Table, Nashua and Citation, each of which has earned over \$1,000,000.

It remains to be seen whether in 50 years or so the golden records of this trio of millionaires will, like those of Miss Woodford and Iroquois, have turned to yellowing pages in the record book. It wasn't too long ago when a horse that earned \$100,000

in his lifetime was newsworthy. Today, no less than a dozen have earned more than \$100,000 just since the first of the year. Ballyhoo topping the list with \$439,045.

These days it is possible for a horse to earn \$100,000, or the greater part of it in any of 39 races. Four horses will do so on July 30. Miss Woodford raced 48 times, winning 37, to earn \$118,270 in her lifetime. On July 30 the Delaware Handicap, for fillies and mares, will be worth a gross of \$150,000. Three other \$100,000 races that day are: Aqueduct's BrJooklyn Handicap, the Arlington Park Futurity and Monmouth Park's Sorority Stakes.
