LaRoche, a 12-year-old lefty, also made two base-hit robbing catches in leading his mates to the extra-inning victory over what was called Tordondo's best all-star aggregation in the four-year history of the league.

DAVE WAS allowed to continue playing ball in the Redondo league even after moving with his family to their home on Anza Ave. in Torrance two years ago, because of a technicality in the Little League rules.

And you can bet that the Tordondo people today are in favor of revising that particular rule!

The Torrance nine went ahead on Tim Speak's two-run homer in the 3rd, 3-1, only to see LaRoche come back in the 4th to put South Redondo — twice defending District 26 champions — ahead 4-3 on a line-shot over the rightfield fence with two outs.

The score stood that way until the 6th—when with the chips down and two outs — Danny Chandler hammered an Irl Davis change-up over the scoreboard in centerfield to knot the count at 4-4, and send the thriller into overtime.

BUT THEN LaRoche appeared again and ruined things by singling up the middle with one out in the 7th, and after one out in the 7th, and after stealing second base, scamper-ed all the way home on a wild throw to right field after a perfect sacrifice bunt up the first base line.



Brad — a second year all-star — struck out 12, but walked seven. The American all-stars pulled off one double play as Lomita left six base runners stranded.


