Rule by Monarchy Might Follow Franco in Spain

(Continued from Page 1) an Act of 1947, ratified by a national plebiscite, Franco may remain at the helm for as long as he chooses and is able. A regency council already has been set up to select a king who is at least 30 years old, a Catholic, and who is capable. Don Juan is said to have charm, ability, and is decidedly pro-western.

If no agreement on a Franco successor is reached, then a regent with tenure may be chosen.

Francisco is presented in the many daily newspapers, at least one of which is government owned, as an active participant in the nation's affairs and currently is greeting several new ambassadors assigned to Madrid including our own new representative, Drexel Biddle. Franco's popularity was tested recently, according to a Spanish information source and confirmed by American information officials, when he visited one of the provinces during the civil war. He was received with acclaim by some of his most bitter political opponents due to his keeping a promise he would restore economic prosperity to that section of the country.

In a briefing at the modern new building housing the Spanish Ministry of Information and Tourism, both Spanish and American officials revealed the military, political and economic aspects of a program that seems to be working smoothly and harmoniously.

Appearing on the program were Col. Joseph Payne, USAF, who described the functions of the Joint U.S. Military Group in Spain; Carroll S. Hinman, Chief, Program and Economic

Division, U.S. Operations Mission to Spain attached to the large American embassy, and S. Antonio Elias, Office of Political Affairs for North America, Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Working with officials of both nations in arranging the interchange of information was John Hutchinson of the American embassy staff who typified the enthusiasm and efficiency of our American representatives in Spain.

From the visitor's standpoint Spain offers much in the way of divergent entertainment and sightseeing at all seasons of the year. Californians will find the terrain around Madrid familiar as are other sections of the country that gave this state its early recorded history. But there are cold, invigorating climates at high altitudes where there is perpetual snow and perpetually warm seashore towns where the charm of the east combines with the comfort of the west.

Life in the provinces goes on much as it did centuries ago while in cities, like Madrid, the people move about using most modern means of transportation. Even in the large cities, though, the horse and cart remain in evidence and one still has to be cautious when he walks the streets for more reasons than the lively automobile and truck traffic.
