"Challenge of Parenthood . . ."

Dear Ann Landers: Thank you for printing the column on mothers who run next door "for five minutes" and while she's gone, the house burns to the ground and small children perish in the fire. It's about time somebody said it.

I know five mothers in holering distance who are guilty of this. My next door neighbor leaves her 8-year-old daughter in charge of four young ones (including a two-month-old baby) while she goes to her "Mother's Club" every Saturday afternoon. She thinks this makes her a good mother.

I showed your column to one of my close friends who also leaves her small children alone at night. She said, "My children will grow up self-reliant and independent. Yours will be clinging vines." Do you wish to comment? — A READER

Dear Reader: One of the challenges of parenthood is knowing where to draw the line between being over-protective and derelict. It is true that when parents smother children with over-protection the youngsters grow up to be emotional cripples. But it is vastly important that their physical safety be assured so that they WILL grow up.

A mature, responsible 12-year-old should be able to care for younger brothers and sisters in the absence of parents. But I don't think children under this age should be left alone, afternoon or evening.
