

MTA Should Take Its Cues From Disney, Supervisor Hahn Claims

If the Metropolitan Transit Authority were as practical as Walt Disney there would be at least one rapid transit monorail line to serve the people of Los Angeles County today, Supervisor Kenneth Hahn declared as he urged the MTA to get busy and construct a practical, rapid rail line to serve the public.

"For the past two years there has been a monorail system at Disneyland and it has carried nearly four and a half million passengers. While the line is only two miles long it demonstrates clearly that rapid monorail transit is feasible and practical," the Supervisor stated.

HE ADDED that there would be major "break through" if MTA were to take immediate steps to build a monorail system along one of the major freeways, preferably the Harbor freeway, with the rail being suspended over the freeway center strip.

"However, the MTA has not had the foresight to do this. Instead it has spent thousands of dollars in making costly surveys which are not practical and in dreaming up grandiose plans which would not really serve the public," Supervisor Hahn continued.

HE POINTED out that the MTA has made no practical plans to serve the areas which are in greatest need of rapid transit — particularly the southern and southwest section of Los Angeles County, including the vicinity of Exposition Park and the Los Angeles International Airport.

"More than 2,000,000 persons each year attend sports events at the Sports Arena and at the Coliseum. More than 6,000,000 persons pass through International Airport each year, yet the MTA has never planned to serve these areas with a rapid transit system."

INSTEAD OF concentrating on providing service to the areas of greatest need, where the people cannot afford two cars, the MTA comes up with a proposal to build a "backbone line" extending from the civic center to Century City—a development that has not yet been built," Hahn continued.

He added that he is convinced that MTA would receive public support and that a good rapid transit system could be provided the people of Los Angeles County if the Authority were to adopt a "hard-headed, business-like" approach to the problem of meeting the public transportation needs of the Southland.

L. A. Plans Body Denies Zoning Bid

The Los Angeles City Planning Commission has disapproved a change in zoning from industrial to residential on 203rd St., westerly of Denker Ave. However, it was indicated that this change might be reconsidered if a larger area were included.

This action was taken on a request submitted by property owner Kenneth Batram and others who sought R-3 multiple zoning on both sides of 203rd Street between Denker Ave. and 350 feet west of Denker.

THE PRESENT zoning on 203rd St. between Denker Ave. and Western Ave. is M2 light industrial on the south side and M3 heavy industrial on the north side in spite of the fact that the street is entirely developed with homes except for seven vacant lots near Denker Ave.

COMMISSION action was based on the findings of Hearing Examiner James A. Moss who conducted a public hearing in Wilmington on May 22.

At that time petitions and statements were submitted showing that a substantial number of residents were in favor of the change although at least four persons were opposed, feeling that the property might be suitable for future commercial or industrial developments.

The Planning Commission has announced that it would schedule a public hearing on the question of residential rezoning for the entire two blocks from Denker to Western including a 100 foot strip of land midway between 203rd and 204th St.
