

Hons Leads Indians In Upset of Solons

Fillies Go in Milady 'Cap

Darling June and Linita, stakes winning stars at the current Hollywood Park meeting and two of the fastest fillies produced in California in recent years, are slated to battle it out with at least a half-dozen other lady thoroughbred speed burners in the \$20,000 added Milady Handicap today.

The Milady is for fillies and mares of three years old and upward at one mile. It is the last stakes test for the distaffers before they meet in the \$35,000 added Vanity Handicap July 1 for the filly and mare championship of the Inglewood track's 1961 meet.

Darling June, who won the Hollywood Express for her owners, Mr. and Mrs. Ellwood B. Johnston, against the fleet-

est of the western colts in her last start, will have the services of Hollywood's leading rider, Billy Shoemaker, who with his saddle pad will add up to 124 pounds, co-high weight of the race with Linita.

LINITA, going after her fourth straight Hollywood Park victory, will be steered by the world's winningest jockey, the "Fountain of Youth kid," Johnny Longden. The four-year-old daughter of Indian Hemp, owned by Corradini and Dorney, recently won the Sequoia Handicap, a six-furlong sprint, from the best of the western fillies and mares including her arch rival, Darling June.

Darling June and Linita will face plenty of red-hot conten-

tion in Nelson B. Hunt's Wiggle 2nd, a stakes winner in Australia and America who beat a fast field at six furlongs in her last start; Connie M. Ring's Tritoma, winner of the Santa Maria Handicap at Santa Anita; Howard B. Keck's Paris Pike, who won the Hollywood Oaks last year and who holds a mile win already this season at Inglewood, and Ralph Lowe's Taboo, winner of the first divi-

of the Santa Monica Handicap at Santa Anita, second in the recent Sequoia at Hollywood and victorious in her last start at a mile and a sixteenth against Jenny De Lieu and other good ones.

JOCKEY Ralph Neves, who is among the top five American riders in total victories, will ride Wiggle 2nd, who will carry third high weight of the Milady field at 120 pounds.
