Joining in top leadership of the campaign from this area will be Mrs. Gerson Jacobson, Torrance, president of the newly chartered South Bay Chapter of Hadassah, and Mrs. Randolph C. Fields, Gardena, membership vice president. Besides Torrance and Gardena, Mrs. Jacobson said, the new unit of Hadassah covers Manhattan Beach, Hermosa Beach, Redondo Beach, Palos Verdes, Rolling Hills, San Pedro, Compton and Hawthorne.
