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Stress Safety During Walk to And From Class

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Motorists and parents this week were urged by Superin-tendent of Schools Ellis A. Jarvis to redouble their efforts to assure maximum safety for the more than 600,000 pupils who returned to school last

who returned to school last Monday morning. "All efforts of our school people, safety organizations, and law enforcement agencies in trying to instill safety will go for naught if individual motorists and parents do not cooperate," the superintendent said in urging a two-point pro-gram. gram

gram. For the motorists he again urged that all possible caution be used in school neighbor-hoods and on routes customar-ily used by students coming and going to school.

AND FOR PARENTS Jarvis

stressed that the success of the program depends on their abil-

program depends on their abil-ty to impress their children bith proper safety habits, either walking or riding a bi-cycle to and from school. In addition, the superinten-dent suggested the following safety tips for parents who drive their youngsters back and forth to school: 1. Have children sit well back in the scat to insure safety in

Have children sit well back in the seat to insure safety in the event of sudden stops.
Have car doors closed tightly and locked; prevent children from playing with door handles.
Be overly cautious when approaching school; and watch for wongsters running into the

for youngsters running into the street. 4. Have a designated loca-tion where the youngster is dropped off and picked up each

day. 5. Have this prearranged pot on the school side of the street only; do not permit chil-dren to cross mid-block or from

between parked cars. 6. Have respect for all traf-fic laws and school regulations; their observance contributes to the safety of all youngsters. . .

JARVIS ALSO stressed the value of parents selecting a safe route to school for chil-dren close enough to walk to the suggested that parents alk the route with their chil-dren at least once and point out the hazards and dangers to avoid.

to avoid. He said children walking to school should be reminded of the importance of crossing only at marked crosswalks, to look both ways and make sure the road is clear before crossing, to cross only on proper signals, never to go into the roadway from between two parked cars, and where there is no sidewalk and it is necessary to walk in and it is necessary to walk in the street, to walk on the left facing traffic.
