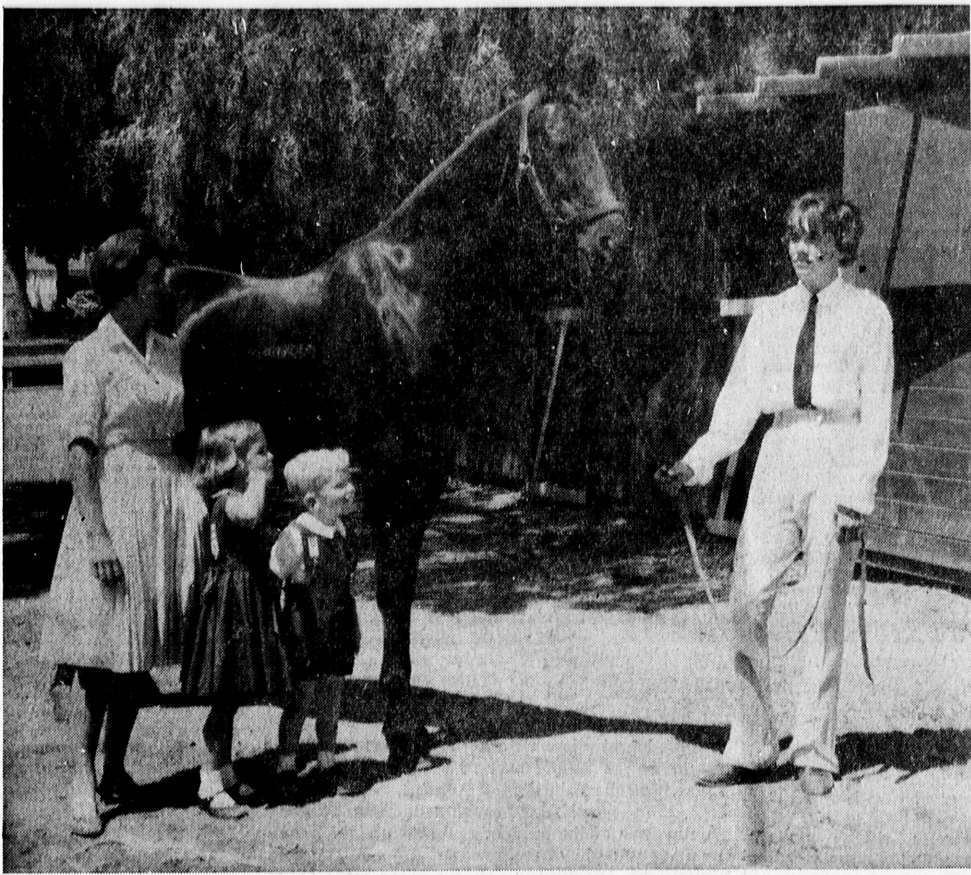


West's Finest To Compete in Annual Horse Show

"Teenagers ARE Different . . ."

Dear Ann Landers: Our daughter will be going away to college soon and I know only too well that the next step is marriage. What worries me is how will she be able to manage a home of her own when she can't fry an egg, much less put a meal together?

Before you jump down my throat, let me tell you that I've tried to teach her but she's never shown any interest in learning how to sew on a button or prepare a roast. In this day and age there's a lot of teenage activity — early dating, parties, swimming, skating, TV — and naturally, every girl must have her own telephone. You will have to admit, Ann, that teenagers are different today than when you and I grew up.

How can we teach a daughter to be a home-maker when she won't stay home long enough to learn? — OLD SCHOOL

Dear Old School: Teenagers ARE different than when we grew up — but so are parents. They are at home less, they are occupied with outside interests, they are often too permissive (and sometimes downright collapsible under pressure).

There are 24 hours in every day. If you've allowed your daughter to spend all her time entertaining herself then you must accept the blame for her deficiencies.

Of course a 12-year-old would rather munch popcorn in front of a TV set than to peel potatoes or set a table. But as her mother you should have insisted that she give you a hand with the cleaning and cooking and ironing — not because you needed her help, but because SHE needed to learn the domestic skills.

Dear Ann: I hate to be a stool pigeon and I refuse to be one but I can no longer sit silently by and ignore a sickening and vicious practice which has been going on under my nose for much too long.

Portuguese Bend Horse Show Scheduled For Sept. 23-24

Top exhibitors and horses, numbering 600 or more, will compete in the two-day 1961 Portuguese Bend National Horse Show to be held Sept. 23 and 24 at the Portuguese Bend Club, Narcissa Dr. and Portuguese Bend.

The show, an annual event, is sponsored by the Palos Verdes Peninsula Committee of the Children's Hospital. Mrs. Harry H. Wetzel, Jr., and Mrs. Andrew D. Shaw are co-chairmen for this year's event.

Manager and announcer of the show will be Allen Ross, who for many years has managed the Grand National Horse Show at Cow Palace in San Francisco, the Santa Barbara National Horse Show and others of the larger shows on this coast. Judges will be Lee Sole of Sacramento and Curtis P. Nelson of Carmichael. AHSA steward, ringmaster, paddock secretary and secretary will be Horace Rupp, Santa Barbara; Col. Alex Sysin, Stanford; Mr. and Mrs. Richard Glascock, Palos Verdes.

The All-Junior show with three medal classes, among the 18 classes competing, will be held on Saturday. Winners will compete for United States championships at the Cow Palace and Madison Square Gardens.

The open show on Sunday will have eight stake classes competing along with classes of hunters, jumpers, Shetland ponies and Arabian horses.

Celebrities have been named "Godparents for the Day" of some of the children who have been patients at the hospital. The "godparents" and children will oc-

cupy the "Celebrity Box" and will present trophies.

Special events include "Golden Horse Quadrille" whose palomino mounts perform intricate square dance routines. "Yankee Doodle Dandy" and his pony will set the theme for the grounds for the 1961 show. Red, white and blue bunting will be used to decorate.
