Defense Department Executives Favor Shelter Aid, Board Told

The Defense Dept. agrees in principle with the proposal by the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors that the Federal government should provide matching funds on a dollar per dollar basis for construction of local goveernment units, it was remorted this week by Gilbert local government units, it was reported this week by Gilbert W. However, Lindsay stated that However, Lindsay stated that he was informed by Lawrence Klamont, special assistant for civil defense Secretary of De-fense Robert S. McNamara, that Congress has not yet ap-propriated sufficient funds to enable the Defense Depart-ment to allocate matching

LINDSAY emphasized that the Los Angeles County metro-politan area is one of the most important defense areas in the nation because of the heavy concentration of defense, elec-

tronics, and aviation plants. Because of the huge concen-tration of population, mass evacuation would be impossi-ble and the only alternative is a comprehensive shelter build-ing program.

"I think it is a very hopeful sign that the Pentagon has realized the necessity of cooperating with local government in providing shelters for the civilian population," Hahn declared after hearing Lindsav's report. say's report.
