"Muscular dystrophy is one of the most tragic diseases known to mankind for the greater number of its suffergreater number of its sufferers are small children who rarely live beyond their teens!" This statement was made by Ronald Nash, Regional Director, Southern California, for Muscular Dystrophy Associations of America, Inc., principal speaker at luncheon hosted by the Association for Junior clubwomen of the Marina District.

Presiding was Mrs. Charles Hillinger, Marina District president. Honored guests included Mrs. G. Robert Hemstreet, California C F W C Health Chairman, Mrs. Joseph Boylan, Marina District Dean of Chairman and Mrs. Robert Reaney, Marina District Press Chairman. California Junior clubwomen have made MD a two-year project. Last year, 138 clubs spent 10,000 volunteer hours, raising \$68,000 to aid the fight against MD. This year they will assist the MDAA pro-

gram in patient service and public information projects and through participation in

and through participation in the December fund - raising drive to aid MD victims.

In telling of the MDAA program Mr. Nash said: "The MDAA program is dedicated to the conquest of MD, a disease that afflicts nearly a quarter million known persons today." He told of the Association's growth in 10 years from a small group of parents of patients to an organization today having 380 chapters and supporting 100 research projects in the United States and abroad, A new world research center, The ed States and abroad. A new world research center, The Institute for Muscle Disease supported by Association funds conducts intensive research into the mysteries of MD as well as allied neuromuscular diseases and will help speed the discovery of a cure for MD. "In its 10 year history", Nash said, "MDAA has expended 13½ millions for research including the IMD and nearly 8 million dollars for patient services." lars for patient services.
