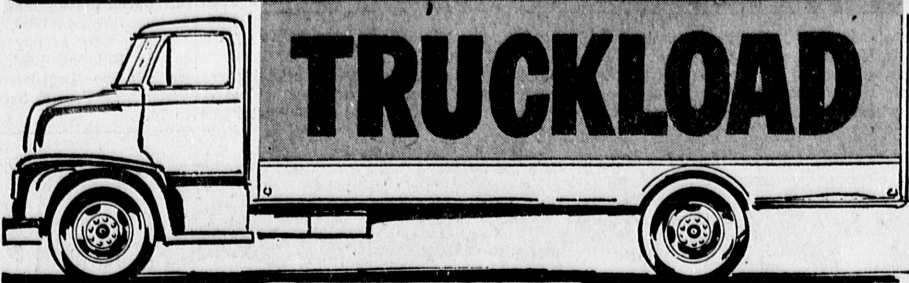

General Telephone Co. Newspaper Wins Award

California General News, official newspaper for the 10,000 employees of General Telephone Co. of California, this month, was adjudged honorable mention winner in the 1961 Press-Radio-TV Top Story awards of the California State Fair and Exposition, in Sacramento.

Editor Phillip I. Myers received the coveted certificate

from Governor Brown at a special banquet this week. The General News "Golden State" series was responsible for the honor.

The series is about the State of California—its history and its government. The purpose of the articles is to sustain General Telephone's program of participation in state affairs, to educate its employees in their state's legislative processes and historical highlights; to create an awareness in employees of benefits derived from both economic and natural advantages to be found in California.

This is the second State Fair award for General News in three times entered. The publication won top honors — The Gold Medal — in 1959.

Labor Relations Course Offered

A tuition-free labor-management relations course to be offered each Monday evening from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. began Monday, Los Angeles Trade Tech College has announced. The course will be conducted at Orville Wright Junior High School, 5506 W. 80th St. in Westchester.

Subjects to be covered will include the history and development of the Labor Movement, development of the National Labor Relations Act, the Wagner Act, the Taft-Hartley Act, the Landrum-Griffith Act, and current topics in the field of labor-management relations. Two guest speakers will highlight the program. A Union business agent will speak on "Union Organization" and a management representative, active in collective bargaining circles, will speak on grievance procedures and negotiation techniques.

The course will be conducted by Torrance resident, E. W. Shimko, employee benefits supervisor at Space Technology Laboratories Inc.

Shimko received his BBA in Industrial Relations from Loyola University of Los Angeles, and his MSA in personnel management from UCLA.

No prerequisites are needed for this course.

New Phone Book Comes Out Soon

The new October 1961 Southern Section telephone directory will be on its way to local telephone subscribers starting Monday, Sept. 25, R. S. Pyle, Pacific Telephone's Torrance manager, announced today.

The 1,132 page alphabetical edition with a combined local classified section will have an approximate initial distribution of 307,000 in the southern area. Another 144,000 copies of the directory will be sent to other parts of Los Angeles, and other national and world cities.

"Some parallel to local growth might be drawn from the new edition," Pyle pointed out, "for the alphabetical section has grown by some 11,000 listings over last year's total."

Some new style telephone numbers appear in the Southern Section directory for the first time this year. These numbers, part of the nation-wide All-Number-Calling (ANC) plan, have dropped the familiar two-letter prefix in favor of an all-number designation.

For example, Pacific Telephone's Torrance business office phone is now listed as 328-1101. The introductory pages contain a brief explanation of ANC as well as informational maps for dialing across the Los Angeles extended area, and a list of area codes for Direct Distance Dialing throughout the nation.

Completion of the delivery is expected within the week, Pyle said.
