Half a Hundred Torrance Elks To Attend Annual Convention

Some fifty Elks from Torrance Lodge 1948 will join 9000 others throughout California to attend the 47th Annual California Elks Assn. Convention, to be held in Santa Monica Sept. 27, 28, 29 and 30, according to Charles D. Marquand.

With all available hotel rooms in Santa Monica taken by early registrants, many delegates and their wives will be provided with facilities in surrounding cities, including nearby Beverly Hills, Tad Henderson, chairman of the Santa Monica Chamber of Commerce Convention Bureau, disclosed.

Registration is scheduled for all day Wednesday, Sept. 27.

CONVENTION Chairman Virgil B. Kingsley of Santa Monica will introduce State President Guy A. Daniels of Redlands as master of ceremonies, and Grand Exalted Ruler William A. Wall of Palm Beach, Fla., will address the Elks at the official opening ceremonies of the convention at 9 p.m. in the Santa Monica Civic Auditorium.

The initial business session will be conducted at 10 a.m. Thursday, Sept. 28, in the lodge room of the host Santa Monica 906 BPOE, and the final business meeting will be held at 10 a.m. Saturday with the installation of officers and presentation of trophies.

TEAMS AND individuals will seek statewide honors in

ritualistic, billiard, bowling, golf, drill team and pistol shooting in competitions during the four-day meet.

Solemnity will mark the Elks memorial service at 11 a.m. Friday, Sept. 29, in the civic auditorium, with veteran actor Monte Blue paying the final tribute in honor of the dead.

Reports will be made concerning the Elks contributions to the aid of hospitalized veterans and the organization's major project fund.

SOCIAL events will include the state president's cocktail party and banquet, the exalted rulers' dinner dance, and nightly lodge dances. Special tours and programs are on the agenda for the wives of delegates.

Tracing the growth of Elksdom, a musical extravaganza, "The Heart of Elksdom," will be presented by the massed chorus of California Elks and narrated by stage and TV star Hugh Marlowe, as the finale to the convention.
