The bride is the daughter of Mrs. Jack Monroe Randal of Lubbock. She was graduated from Texas Tech in 1957 with a BA degree with a Spanish major. When in college, she was the recipient of many honors. She was president of the first chapter of Mortar Board; president of Sigma Delta Pi, Spanish honor society; vice president of the Cosmopolitan Club; member of Phi Kappa Phi; Junior Council; Alpha Lambda Delta; Alpha Chi; Delta Delta sorority and was selected Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities.

After Sept. 5, the newlyweds will be at home at 4294 Grant Rd., Mountain View, Calif.

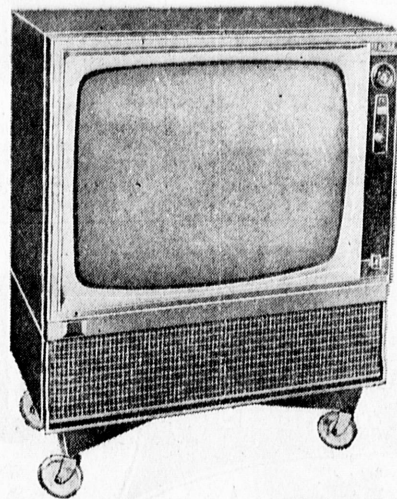

Mayor and Mrs. Albert Isen of Torrance chose the Three Lions Restaurant as the site of their wedding anniversary dinner.

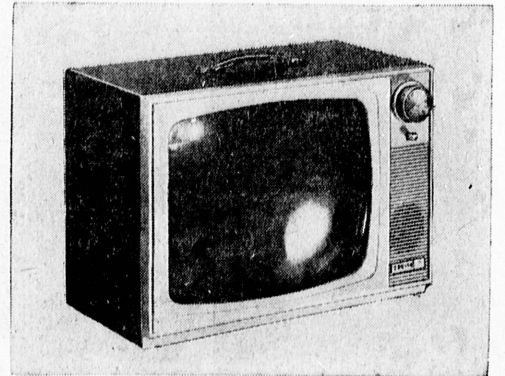
