

Walteria's Community Church Notes 10th Year

The Walteria Community Methodist Church is celebrating its 10th Anniversary this Sunday, Sept. 24. Special guest and speaker at the 11 a.m. service will be Bishop Gerald H. Kennedy of the Los Angeles Area, The Methodist Church.

On Sept. 23, 1951, the first organizational meeting of the church was held in Walteria Park. Since that time the church has purchased property in the Walteria area, constructed over \$100,000 in church buildings, and has grown to a membership of 440.

AN AFTERNOON program is being planned where the highlights of the past 10 years will be lifted up and the history of

the church presented. All charter members of the church are being invited as special guests at this affair.

Speaker of the day, Bishop Kennedy, will be preaching at the 11 a.m. service. Bishop Kennedy is one of the leading

churchmen in the Methodist Church. He headed his denomination in 1960-61 as president of the Council of Bishops. Bishop Kennedy was elected in 1948 and served four years in the Portland, Ore., area, and since 1952 in Los Angeles. The

Bishop is well known for his preaching and is author of many books. This past year he was appointed by Governor Brown to serve on the State Board of Education. The church is located at 3646 Newton St.

Time Change Set Sept. 24

"The time is 1:59 and 50 seconds."

These words will be accompanied by quick action on the part of one telephone man in the a.m. hours of Sunday, when Pacific Standard Time replaces Pacific Daylight Saving Time.

Although numerous timepieces can be changed at an earlier or later hour, at least one will have to make the switch "right on the nose." That time-piece is Pacific Telephone's "Audichron" time-of-day service, UL 3-1212.

THE DEVICE, which serves telephone users in the Los Angeles and Ventura vicinities, gives out the time to some

175,000 callers per day, according to R. S. Pyle, the company's Torrance manager.

"Actually, there are two Audichron machines," Pyle explained, "one in operation, and the other synchronized for standby usage. Both are located in a downtown Los Angeles office. Shortly before 2 a.m. (PDT) Sunday, the standby machine will be set back one hour."

AT THE stroke of 2 a.m., the stand-by machine will be put into operation and the service will continue uninterrupted, announcing: "the time is 1 o'clock, exactly."

Pair to Bring Shakespeare To Marymount College Stage

Marymount College, through arrangement with Paul Gregory, will present Richard Gray and Mayo Loizeaux in "Caviare to the General" next Tuesday on the Palos Verdes Estates campus.

The distinguished pair of actors will bring 18 characters from Shakespeare to the stage, in dramatized scenes from eight of the Bard's best-known

Their selections will include "Henry V," "Hamlet," "Romeo and Juliet," "Macbeth," "Much Ado About Nothing," "The Merchant of Venice," "Othello" and "Richard III."

GRAY RECENTLY returned from a tour with "A Phoenix Too Frequent" with Agnes Moorhead, and Miss Louizeaux is well known for her dramatic interpretations on the Broadway stage and in TV.

She is particularly impressed with college presentations of good drama and adds, "if colleges keep putting on exciting theater fare which young people can afford and cannot see on TV, even our own playwright may throw away their neurotic cliches and get away from the sordid drab, which seem to have been their preoccupation for all too long."

"CAVIARE TO THE General" is presented by Paul Gregory, well known to theater goers for his productions of "The Caine Mutiny Court Martial," "Don Juan in Hell," and "John Brown's Body."

The Marymount College performance will be held in the Student-Faculty Center auditorium, and is scheduled to begin at 8 p.m.

Three Road Projects in Carson Area

Three road projects are under way or planned for the Carson area, Supervisor Burton W. Chace announced yesterday.

One is at the intersection of Carson and Figueroa Streets and will consist of reconstructing and remodeling the roadway shoulders on both sides of Carson as it approaches Figueroa in order to create additional traffic lanes. Cost of the project is estimated at \$1,850.

Chace pointed out that both Carson and Figueroa Streets are County Master Plan Major Highways, with recent traffic counts indicating that more than 40,000 vehicles use this intersection daily.

THE PROJECT on Francisco Street, from Figueroa Street to Main Street, is progressing as scheduled, Chace said, with work scheduled to continue the rest of this week. The improvement consists of grading and paving the roadway.

Plans and specifications for the third improvement in the Carson area were approved today by the Los Angeles County Road Department, Supervisor Chace said. They call for construction of streets in two adjacent subdivisions located on the south side of 215th Street westerly of Dolores St.

CHACE SAID the developer plans to construct 738 feet of new local streets, the work to include excavation, grading, paving and the construction of sidewalks, drainage structures, curbs and gutters.

Completion of the project, according to Chace, will provide access to 35 homesites. Street improvements are expected to cost the developer an estimated \$22,200, he added.
