

SAXONS WIN; TARTARS TIE

North High Eleven Rolls Over Warren

North Torrance crammed 14 points into the first quarter and tacked on six more in the final period to roll over host Warren, 20 to 13, in the opening grid game of the season for both squads.

Dan Claxton scored twice for the Saxons to lead the touchdown parade.

Claxton rambled five yards on a first quarter end-around to climax a 65 yard drive and give North its first score of the season. Guard Rich Parker kicked the first of his two conversions to give North a 7 to 0 lead.

Paul Harmon at left tackle gave the Saxons their second score of the evening in the second period when he gobbled up a Warren fumble and legged it 55 yards for a six point

er. Parker again converted. It was not until the early part of the third quarter that Warren was able to dent the stony North defense. Bob Brown swept around left end for 45 yards and the TD.

North got the score back in the latter half of the quarter when Claxton snared a Warren pass and galloped 55 yards for the final Saxon tally of the night.

Playing against reserves, and with just 30 seconds left on the clock, Warren moved down the field on pass plays to ring up another score.

Bob Shoup, North grid mentor, praised his defensive forces for their heads-up play and good pursuit. He stressed that his offense will have to improve and that once past the starting eleven the talent rapidly decreases as evidenced by the shoddy play of the reserves in the fourth quarter.

Injury Jinx, Loyola Halt BMHS, 30-6

Injuries and a powerful Loyola eleven proved too much for Bishop-Montgomery Friday night as the Knights dropped their opening game of the year, 30 to 6, to their perennially strong Catholic League foe.

Montgomery's only score of the evening came on a 50 yard pass play from John Clark to Fred Riganti. The touchdown came in the second quarter and narrowed Loyola's lead to 12 to 6, a margin that remained until just before the end of the third quarter when Loyola's rugged grid machine and injuries finally tired the Knights.

Tom Horgan proved to be the man of the night for Loyola, scoring four times.

The injury jinx that has been working all year against the Knights struck again when first string end Louis Market was knocked out of the game in the first half with a head injury.

Minor injuries to Bruce Smith and Mike Fox also crippled the Knights. Smith went out with an ankle injury while Fox sustained a leg injury.

Bob Roy Scores On Lengthy Run, THS Deadlocks

Torrance High started the pigskin season off with a bang, scoring on the opening kickoff, then fumbled and stumbled through the rest of the game as visiting Redondo battled the Tartars to a 12-12 tie.

Bob Roy flashed 85 yards with the opening boot to get the Tartars off on the right foot, but THS could not continue in such spectacular fashion and Redondo came on in the final stages of the game to earn a tie.

Jerry McLean rambled 55 yards with a lateral from Torrance quarterback John Cambron in the third quarter for the other Tartar tally.

IT WASN'T until the third period that Redondo managed to hit the scoreboard, and it took a fumble by the home team to do it.

After a long drive by the Seahawks, Torrance settled down and held them on their own two-yard stripe. On the first Tartar play from scrimmage, though, a fumble resulted and an alert Redondo man pounced on the pigskin in the THS end-zone for the TD.

Redondo tied the score up in the fourth quarter on a 25 yard pass play.

CAMBORN TURNED out to be the eventual hero for the Tartars, blocking both Seahawk conversions.

THS grid coach Irv Kasten said the game showed the Tartars had good personnel, but the team spirit was still lacking.

He said, "We found we could pass, but we did not try enough. We also lacked the scoring punch, getting down to the 10-yard line three times without scoring."

The two Sam's, Bates and Wicks, were too much for the visitors. Bates at left half rallied Harbor with his 70 yard punt return and gave them the initiative they needed to go ahead and win.

Wicks, at fullback, provided the other half of the Hawks ground-gaining duo.
