Economist

To Address Area Group

Dr. V. Orval Watts, the noted economist, will speak on Oct. 11 to the Lutheran Liberty League at the Resurrection Lutheran Church. With current emphasis on the United Nations, Dr. Watts' speech, "The Truth About the United Nations," should be of vital interest. His additional fields of interest as economic consultant author and lecturer reinforce his ability to present the current picture of the United Nations, sponsors say.

He received his Ph.D. from Harvard with special work in history and sociology. For 17 years he taught economics in colleges and universities, and for seven years was economic counsel for the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce where he instituted courses in free-enterprise economics which are now an accepted part of chamber of commerce services.

He is currently engaged in private consulting, lecturing, and writing for educational foundations and business concerns interested in economic education. Dr. Watts' latest publication is a booklet in the Human Action Series of the Freedom School, Colorado Springs, entitled, "Should we Strengthen the United Nations?"

The public is invited to hear Dr. Watts speak at 7:30 p.m. The Lutheran League meets at the Resurrection Lutheran Church, 330 Palos Verdes Blvd. No tickets are necessary, but a free will offering will be taken.
