During the week of Oct. 15 to 21, the Torrance News Torch, the Torrance High newspaper, and THS will join the thousands of American newspapers in observing National Newspaper Week.

NNW is an industry-wide celebration which pays tribute to the 1,770 daily and 9,000 weekly newspapers published in this country. It is designed specially to focus the spotlight on the role the newspaper plays in protecting the people's three great freedoms—freedom of the press . . . freedom of speech . . . and freedom of religion.

OCT. 25 will mark the opening session of the Pioneer League Forums. The first forum will be held at THS with Ray Bynum, ASB president, presiding as chairman, and Dr. Carl Ahee giving a welcome speech. The meeting will begin at 1:30 p.m.

ORDINANCE NO. 1263  
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AMENDING APPENDIX I OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, 1954, ADOPTED BY ORDINANCE NO. 791, RECLASSIFYING CERTAIN PROPERTY DESCRIBED IN PLANNING COMMISSION CASE NO. 722 (A-1 to C-1).  
WHEREAS, the City Council deems that it is to the public interest that certain real property in the City of Torrance, hereinafter described in Section 3, (as applied for in Planning Commission Case No. 722), and more particularly described in Section 1 of the Code of the City of Torrance, 1954, be reclassified as follows:  
SECTION 1.
