In a spot for Nytol, a cured insomniac, Reginald Gardiner, dismisses a cellist who has been hired to play slumber music, and a sheep herder who tended the live sheep that are being cata-pulted onto his bed.

brings a smile to our lips. He apparently sells the sponsor's products too. Whatever this young man's


