

'New Look' in Telephone Dials Sneaking Into Town

Local residents may be encountering the "new look" in telephone numbers here as they attempt to place calls to friends or relatives who may have just moved in or had their number changed.

This "new look" is being displayed only by those telephone users involved in the first phase of a new program called "All Number Calling." Designed to replace the traditional two-letter prefix with its corresponding dial position numbers, the system will take approximately five years to become universal in this area, according to J. M. White, Palos

Verdes district manager for General Telephone Co.

AT PRESENT the new seven digit numbers are being assigned only to new customers, or old customers requiring a number change, he said. The new numbering system is being inaugurated to provide more telephone numbers in the future as it will enable the nation's 3,300 phone companies to utilize letter dial positions which could not be used to form the first two letters of familiar words, he explained.

THE DISTRICT manager also pointed out that the number of the local telephone company business office has been changed to 378-6211, which numerically is the old number FR 8-6211.

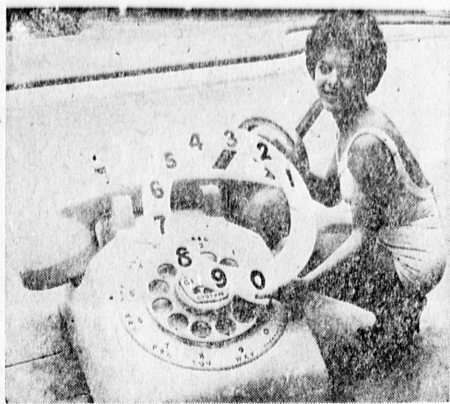
"Of course, the customer may dial either number and reach his customer representative," he said.

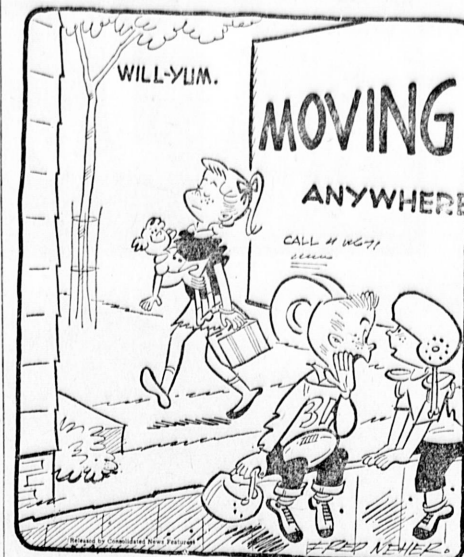

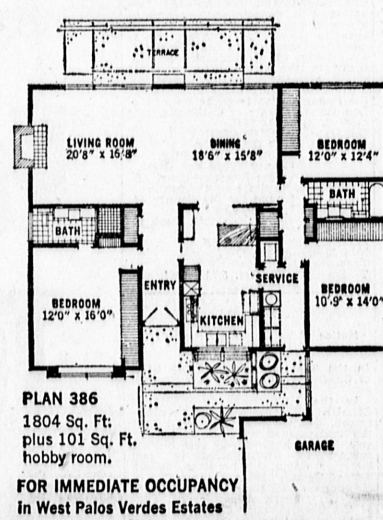
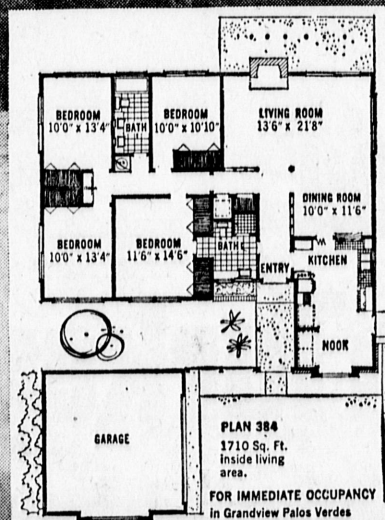

Interment was in a cemetery near Bakersfield. The Mish Funeral Home of Oildale was in charge of arrangements.

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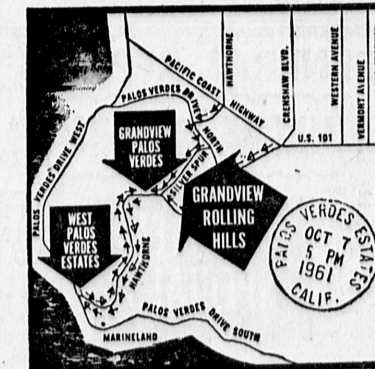
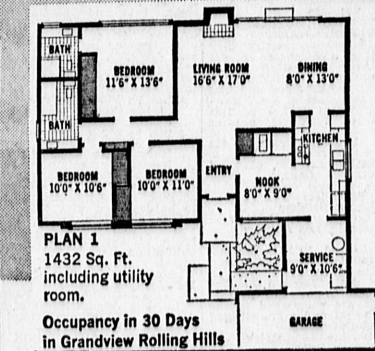
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
