Camp Fire Girls Planning Program for Fall Season

Beginning this month, all the groups of the Harbor District Camp Fire Girls organization are convening in club houses, homes, churches, and other meeting places to plan activities and service programs for the 1961-1962 year under the auspices of the adult members of Camp Fire Girls.

In both morning and evening classes, adult leaders and sponsors are having their training sessions preparatory to heading up the 95 groups of Blue Birds, Camp Fire Girls, and Horizon Clubs active in the Harbor District this current year. A total of 15 hours of special instruction qualifies individuals for their Camp Fire roles as leaders. Spon-

sors need only attend a two-hour session.

On an over-all Council level such items as the Dolly Derby, Christmas caroling, the April candy sale, and 1962's camping program are being studied and arranged for by the individual groups.

ON THE local level, independent plans for Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas, Valentine's Day and Mother's Day are the interest of the leaders who are planning their crafts' activities. Field trips are made to observatories, dairies, museums, bakeries, expositions, fairs, nature study exhibits — to mention only a few of these special expeditions. Adult leaders and members volunteer

from all levels of service for the annual Community Chest Drive.

This year the young people in the groups will serve their respective communities by introducing the "Flame" tree. This is an on-going project of the 50th Year Anniversary celebration of the Camp Fire Girls which took "root" in 1960-61 with the planting of five varieties of seeds of the Erythrina species (one specie is commonly known to Southern Californians as the "Coral" tree).

THESE HAVE been tended by Camp Fire Girls until at the present time, the seedlings have developed enough in their growth cycle to be offered for planting in public parks

and other public grounds. One thousand trees are being reserved for the new Harbor Regional Park. It is anticipated that another thousand will be designated for public grounds and areas in the Los Angeles vicinity, including a great number to be earmarked for our own Harbor District, on a first-come first-served basis until the present supply of seedlings is exhausted. It is already planned to have many of the planting ceremonies take place on Arbor Day in March of 1962.
