His "challenge gift" was the first of its kind to USC, and one of the largest of this type to any university in the nation.

FIRESTONE'S \$250,000 fund vas created only two weeks after he announced an unre-stricted commitment of \$500,-000 to the Master Plan from the Firestone Foundation.
