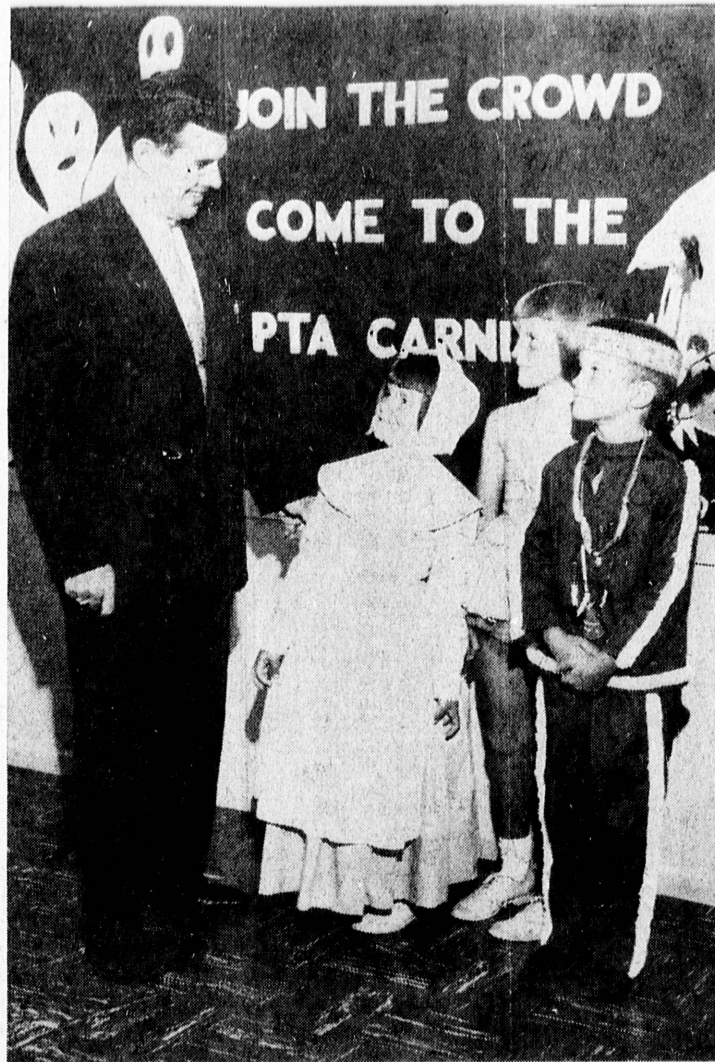
WSCS Meets
