Mrs. Myrtle Gilman, 24704 Oak St., said there will be many booths displaying various types of articles for sale that will make very nice gifts.

A number of food booths will supply various types of food and drink for those who wish to snack or have lunch at the Bazaar.

"FUNDS received from this giant sale will help increase our capacity to help underprivileged persons in Torrance during the coming months," Mrs. Gilman said. "While we always maintain supplies for persons in need, this added income to our group will help increase our supply stockpile."

Some 3,000 persons are expected to attend the day-long rally, according to Mrs. Gilman. The meet will open with a program in which a special report from Korea will be presented.
