

# Verry Scholarship Fund Contributions Coming In

Contributions for the Norm Verry Memorial Scholarship Fund at El Camino College continued to swell, Merl F. Sloan, director of student personnel, said today.

Coming from individual friends, co-workers and neighbors and from statewide business and organization, the memorial fund will probably be utilized for scholarship purposes for the first time next June, the college administrator announced.

Details of the scholarship will be determined by Miss Lois Verry, widow of the late football coach, and by others closely associated with the victim of a series of cerebral hemorrhages.

WHEN IT has been official-

ly established, the scholarship will be administered through the college counseling office under the direction of W. Holmes Smith, assistant director of student personnel.

Contributions are still being accepted in the student personnel office, Mr. Sloan noted. The scholarship is expected to be one of the largest awarded on the El Camino campus.

ON MOTION of Supervisor Kenneth Hahn, the County Board of Supervisors adjourned its meeting Tuesday in honor of the memory of Norm Verry, former All American football star at the University of Southern California and head football coach at El Camino College.

At the close of the regular business meeting of the County's governing body, members of the Board of Supervisors stood reverently for a moment of silent tribute, after which the clerk solemnly called the roll.

A MEMORIAL scroll will be sent to the widow, Mrs. Norman Verry, who resides at 864 11th Street, Manhattan Beach.

Mr. Verry served in the Marine Corps in World War II, after which he played professional football in 1946 and 1947 with the Chicago Rockets.

He joined the El Camino faculty in 1950 after serving as a member of the coaching staff at Inglewood high school for a year.
