"Exercise for Pregnancy and Preparation for Childbirth" will be offered by the Torrance YWCA. The class will begin Oct. 26, at 7:30 p.m. This course is open to women who have completed their twelfth week of pregnancy, and have a doctor's written permission.

This class will have as the instructor Miss Louise Lovenger, registered Physical Therapist, and experienced in teaching this course, having taught similar courses in several YWCA's in this area.

Highlights of what expectant mothers will learn include, how to carry her baby with most comfort and best appearance, how to relax at the drop of a hat, breathing techniques for easier labor, and post natal exercises for that "after baby bulge."

Because the class will be limited, women interested should call at the YWCA immediately and register. The class will be two hours each Thursday evening for eight sessions.

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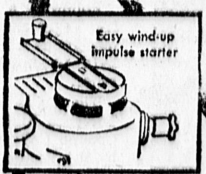
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
